WESTCHESTER.

Diphtheria has been making sad ravages among the little ones in various portions of the county. A family living at Fordham lost four children by the disease, and at Yonkers a day or two since, two infants were buried together from one house.

A lecture will be delivered this evening at St. Jerome's church (Rev. Father Hughes, pastor), in North New York, by Rev. Father Young, of the Paulist Fathers, for the benefit of the poor of that parish, under the auspices of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

The subject of the discourse will be "A Protestant's Reasoning Why and How he Became a Catholic."

Professor G. F. Chandler, of Columbia College, who was solicited by the Board of Water Commissioners of Yonkers to examine the water of Grassy Run, near the reservoir, has sent in his report showing that the water is "practically as pure as the Crown."

The report will probably be published in the Herald, and will be of great interest to the public, for some weeks past has almost engrossed public attention in the city.
