CHEAP TRANSPORTATION.

CONTRACT FOR DAY'S WORK IN THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT—THE AMENDMENT RELATIVE TO THE MONTHLY MEETING OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE CHEAP TRANSPORTATION ASSOCIATION.

The Executive Committee reported in favor of the admission to membership of thirty-five persons or firms, which was adopted.

The report admits the force of the argument that the day work plan gives employment to the laboring classes and saves many poor persons from becoming dependent upon the city for their support.

Aside from the objectionable manner proposed for fixing the work contract, and at the time it is not wise as the time—considering the present state of the finances of the city and the heavy burden of taxation which has to be borne.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this association our public works, where the cost exceeds \$1,000, should be let on contract, and at the time it is not expedient to undertake the construction of works in the city.

Resolved, That our new system of docks now in progress of construction, upon which the welfare of many thousands of people depends, should be completed as soon as possible, and that whatever delay may occur in the construction of other improvements, should be kept to a minimum.

The report was discussed at some length, and after some slight modifications, was adopted.

Resolved, That sections 6, 7 and 8 of the proposed amendments to the charter, which were proposed by the conditional commission and passed the Legislature.

Resolved, That the Board of Managers be and is authorized to employ a committee of five persons, to be known as the Finance Committee, to report upon a proposed change of name, so as to conform to the name of the National Rifle Association.
