The Roman Catholic bishops of Prussia, who addressed a petition to the Emperor and received a reply last month from the Ministers of State, have made rejoinder that to reject the decision of the Vatican Council would be equivalent to an abandonment of Catholicism, and that they are convinced the Holy See would never be unwilling to act in conformity with all proper decisions of the State government.

FRANCE.

THE MAIN POINTS OF THE MEASURE.

It provides that the Senate and Chamber of Deputies shall meet annually in January and sit at least five months in the year. The President of the Republic may communicate with the Chambers by message.

THE SENATE ORGANIZATION BILL.

M. Duhaure also introduced a bill relative to the organization of the Senate. It provides that elections for Senators shall be ordered by decree, which must be issued six months before the day appointed for the holding thereof.
