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BROOKLYN CONGREGATIONALISTS.

THE SCANDAL TO BE REOPENED—ALL PERSONS WHO HAVE EVIDENCE AGAINST MR. BEECHER INVITED TO PRESENT THEIR TESTIMONY—PROTEST BY DR. R. S. STORRS AND OTHERS.

The New York and Brooklyn Association of Congregational Ministers continued its session at the Church of the Holy Trinity, yesterday. After the examination of two candidates for admission to the ministry discussion was resumed on Mr. Beecher's case. The resolutions offered by Mr. Martin were first voted on and negatived. The resolutions offered by the Rev. Dr. H. M. Storrs were then taken up for discussion. A motion to lay them on the table, made by Mr. Lockwood, was lost. Pending the consideration of a motion to adopt the resolutions a letter from the Rev. Dr. R. S. Storrs was read, alluding to a protest against some members of the association.

The following is the letter: No. 100 PINE STREET, BROOKLYN, April 6, 1876. REV. AND DEAR SIR: I learn that your name has been mentioned in the meeting of the Association held in connection with the committee proposed to be appointed to receive and prosecute charges against Rev. W. H. Beecher, and also in connection with a committee proposed to be appointed to investigate such charges on behalf of the association itself.

Will you have the kindness to say to me that I entirely understand the position which you take in this matter? Very truly yours, R. S. STORRS.

Considerable debate on the resolution of Dr. H. M. Storrs followed the reading of this letter. Dr. Huntington believed in the method of dealing with the case by the Association, and he was in favor of the church. A great fundamental principle was at stake, and if they adopted the resolutions proposed their action in so doing would be a precedent for the future. By adopting the resolutions the Association would place themselves on the side of the Advisory Council, and against such action being proposed.
