THE ASSASSIN OF THE MINISTERS HANGED. Constantinople, June 17, 1876.

Hassan, the assassin of the Cabinet Ministers on the night of the 14th inst., was hanged this morning.

The Times' account of the fire in the woollen works of James Templeton, at Ayr, by which twenty-four women lost their lives, says:—"It is stated that Barr, the overseer, who was himself burned to death, locked the door of the room in which the female operatives were at work, thinking the alarm of the fire."

BUTCHERIES BY INDIANS. OVER ONE HUNDRED WHITES KILLED BY THE SCALP HUNTERS. Sidney, Neb., June 17, 1876.

The Indians killed forty men on Thursday, the 15th inst., at a point sixty miles south of this place. They belonged to the Colorado Band.

They killed thirty men in this section within one week. The Indians belong to the Cheyenne Agency, Indian Territory.

LOOKING FOR BAD INDIANS. GENERAL TERRY'S PROGRESS IN HIS EXPEDITION TOWARD THE YELLOWSTONE RIVER—NO HOSTILE WARRIORS FOUND. Washington, June 17, 1876.

The following despatch to General Sheridan has been forwarded to the War Department:—

CAMP OF THE LITTLE MISSOURI, May 30, 1876. We reached this place yesterday. To-day has been employed in scouting up the valley and making a road through the "bad lands" west of the river.

Contrary to all the predictions of the guides and scouts, no Indians have been found here and there are no signs that they have been in this neighborhood within six months or a year. I intend to push on about two marches, halt and spend a party well to the north of the river, and if none are found I may halt once more, for the same purpose, before reaching the Yellowstone. We have had a great deal of hard work making a road through the "bad lands" and the progress has heretofore been slower than I could have wished, but the force is in excellent condition. Few of the troops are sick, and the animals are greatly improved since we left Lincoln.

NAVAL INTELLIGENCE. The United States gunboat Frolic, Commander Kirkland, was the only American man-of-war at Montevideo May 10. All on board well.

A MINING DECISION. Judge Dwinelle, of the Fifteenth District Court, today rendered a decision in the case of the Crown Point Mining Company against the Suro Tunnel Company, to the effect that the failure of the defendants to fulfill their obligations voided their claim to a lien on the mine and the payment of a royalty of \$2 per ton. This decision applies to other similar suits, in which a number of leading mining companies on the Comstock lode are plaintiffs.

FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT. COLEMAN, S. C., June 17, 1876. An extra train on the Anderson branch of the Greenville Railroad fell through a trestle last night at eleven o'clock between Anderson and Belton, killing John Wilson, the engineer, Conductor Leoly and three colored brakemen. The waiting by the late rains was the cause. No passengers were on board.

AN OLD OFFENDER ARRESTED. SAN FRANCISCO, June 17, 1876. Rodolph Blumenbach, who in the winter of 1874 was notorious in Washington for his extravagant displays, has been arrested here by United States officers on a warrant from Washington, in which he is charged with obtaining \$50,000 worth of District of Columbia bonds under false pretenses. He has been kept in private custody for two days. His bail has been fixed at \$20,000, which he is not able to obtain. It appears that the arrest of "Diamond" Blumenbach was brought about by the exertions of Henry Birch, of Washington, who is visiting this coast for his health. A contract in one of the courts here of the will of the late J. H. Blumenbach attracted his attention, resulting in the discovery that J. H. and Davidson were brothers and that the latter was in the city. Mr. Birch traced him, communicated with parties in Washington, and when the papers arrived went with an officer and made the arrest.

THE BRAZILIAN EMPEROR.

HIS MAJESTY'S CALL AT YALE COLLEGE—IMPRESSION OF THE TORPEDO STATION AT NEWPORT. NEWPORT, R. I., June 17, 1876.

The Imperial party left New York this morning by the eight o'clock train for New Haven, where His Majesty hoped to meet Professors Dana and Loomis, whom he knew well by reputation.

On the arrival of the train at New Haven the President of Yale College, accompanied by Professor Dana, met His Majesty and drove with him to the college, where the various departments were carefully examined.

The Emperor was specially interested in the discovery of Professor Brush. When His Majesty had completed his inspection of the college he devoted nearly an hour to conversing with Professors Dana and Loomis on their special studies, and left very well pleased with the Faculty.

While the Emperor was spending his time with the professors the Empress drove about the town, which she found pretty and interesting.

Nothing of interest occurred on the journey until we arrived at New London, where His Majesty witnessed for the first time the ferriage of a railway train across a river. He was very much interested by this Yankee notion, and the Visconde de Bom Retiro said it was like something he had read about in a fairy tale.

On the arrival of the train at Wickford the ferry-boat boats was waiting to convey the passengers across the bay. On board was Mayor Haven, who interested himself in explaining to the Emperor the various points of interest. There was also a large number of ladies on board, who came to catch a glimpse of the distinguished visitors.

Carriages were in waiting at the landing, and their Majesties were at once driven to the Aqueduct Torpedo Station, called to present his compliments and to offer the courtesies of the station to the Emperor. Captain Brees stated that on account of tomorrow being Sunday the workmen would be mostly away, but he would be glad to show His Majesty as much of the station as possible. The Emperor thanked Captain Brees and appointed twelve o'clock to-morrow as the hour for his visit.

Among those who came to the wharf to meet their Majesties was the historian Bayard. The meeting with the Emperor was marked by great warmth. His Majesty insisting that Mr. Bancroft accept a seat in his carriage. The Emperor and Empress will lunch with Mr. Bancroft to-morrow, when they will meet such of the notables of Newport as are already on the ground.

On Monday morning their Majesties will leave for Philadelphia, where they will remain fifteen days.

MR. VANDERBILT'S DONATION. NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 17, 1876. At a spontaneous gathering of representative citizens here to-day, to express gratitude to Commodore Vanderbilt for his donation of \$1,000,000 for the establishment of a university, resolutions were adopted by a standing vote, offering to Mr. Vanderbilt the expression of their profound appreciation of his noble liberality, that so munificent a gift, as a spontaneous act on the part of Mr. Vanderbilt, entitles him not only to our gratitude, but places his name among the foremost benefactors of our country; that such acts must and will go far toward accomplishing that union of hearts on the part of the citizens of this great country, so deeply indebted to our common good.

DEATH FROM BURNS. Mary J. Carlock, of 146th street and Wells avenue, Mott Haven, died at her residence yesterday from the effects of burns received on the 27th inst. The deceased was walking through Canal street, when her clothing caught fire in some unaccountable manner, burning her to the very heart, and she died at the Coroner Rickhoff's house.

FOUND IN THE RIVER. Yesterday evening the dead body of a man, apparently a tramp, was found at Day's Point, Weehawken, N. J., in an advanced stage of decomposition, the body having apparently been in the water for two or three months. The deceased wore six shirts and two pairs of pants. The body is at Coroner Crane's Morgue, Hoboken.

SUICIDE OF AN OLD WOMAN.
