

MARYLAND JOCKEY CLUB. Second Day of the Spring Meeting at Pimlico.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AND EXCITING CONTESTS.

Mary, Danger, Lady Salvors, Frederick the Great and Problem the Winners.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 23, 1878. The second day of the spring meeting of the Maryland Jockey Club, at Pimlico, was a gala occasion. The weather was delightful and the attendance large. The racing was a whole was good, although a bad start in the most important race of the day occasioned considerable murmuring; yet had the start been ever so good the result would no doubt have been the same. Five events were on the card, the first being a race for all ages, one mile, which proved that a good matured horse can beat a first class youngster at the same weight. The second race was for three-year-olds, and it was in this race that the fever raged, but it was when the favorite was half a dozen lengths in front of the others. The colt that had this advantage was Mr. G. L. Lorillard's Danger, by Alarm, dam by War Dance. He is a very large colt all over, being about sixteen hands in height, and finely and powerfully formed. He ran the mile in 1:42 1/2, and there is no doubt but that he could have made the distance in 1:40 had he been forced all the way. He is considered by good judges, who examined him closely after his wonderful performance, the fastest horse of his age that ever was on the American turf. A mile in 1:42 1/2 by a three-year-old, on a moderately good track, is not a fast one—two days ago, it will be remembered, two races were postponed on account of its heaviness from rain—the greatest performance on record, and it is a great pity that the start was not so good for the other horses, so that a contest between them could have occurred. Mr. Pierre Lorillard had a good one in the race, and although he was driven half a mile after being left eighty yards behind at the start, his jockey had discretion enough to take him in hand when he found he could not overtake the big colt Danger. He later could not make any engagements, and the public, during the coming racing campaign, will have frequent opportunities of seeing what appears to be the latest three-year-old in the country. Lady Salvors ran a good race, but was not so good as Frederick the Great, by winning in 1:44 1/2 and 1:45.

ITS DEPARTURE FOR EUROPE ON THE STRAMER CITY OF CHESTER—SCENE ON BOARD. The Columbia College crew called for Chester yesterday on the Inman steamer City of Chester and were given a most enthusiastic farewell by their lady friends and fellow students.

The weather to-day was deep and threatening, and there was a slight sprinkling of rain about one o'clock, but despite these drawbacks there was a large attendance at the grounds, very many ladies being present.
