THE REPUBLIC'S FUTURE.

The attitude of the different political factions in France is now claiming particular attention. Since the fall of Sedan and the naming of M. Thiers as President of the Republic there have been republicans, radicals, socialists, Orleanists, legitimists and Bonapartists, all pulling against each other, openly or covertly, in the struggle for power.

BONAPARTISTS TURNING REPUBLICANS.

Voltaire said: "Il faut toujours se réserver le droit de vivre le lendemain de sa victoire." The number of Bonapartists who have reserved to themselves the right of becoming republicans when it becomes no longer possible to remain Bonapartists will soon be made manifest.

The odds and ends that go to make up the monarchical and imperial party were hopelessly demoralized and ruined by the resignation of MacMahon. He might have saved them. He might have set up a ruler for a time. But he was not the man for the work.

THE REPUBLICAN OATH OF ALLEGIANCE.

The socialists, though finding much to criticize and condemn in the government, are yet moderate republicans, who are willing to curtail the power of the clericals, to greatly harass the men in power by pressing their own views. They will rather keep their own grievances in the background than by any rash act deliver the Republic into the hands of its enemies.
