Clears New York Railways Co. "Let us say to you that, in our opinion, the issue of the integrity of trade unionism is by no means presented, whatever loose statements to the contrary may have been made, by representatives of the company. The question turns upon the integrity of certain contracts entered into, their observance or their violation. Had a breach by the company of the respective contracts of August 6 and August 7 not followed upon a breach by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company of its verbal agreement of August 30, the issue would have been simple."

tor in driving a trolley car before taking it out alone. CAPT. WAKEFIELD TRIED. Officer Erred in Judgment in Keeping 122 Men Overtime.

Capt. George R. Wakefield, transferred from the East Sixty-seventh street station because he held 122 patrolmen on duty two hours and three-quarters after cars had stopped running on the night of September 11, was tried yesterday before Leon Godley, Deputy Commissioner.

Duty of City Government. "While the conduct of the men on strike until Tuesday last was for the most part orderly and peaceful, it is pointed out to you that each new strike declared is calculated to add to the probability of disturbances and disorder. It is the duty of the city government to maintain order and enforce an observance of the laws, to protect life, property and the rights of individuals to labor and to the public and without interference or physical violence. The Mayor, representing the civil forces of government in this city, feels it incumbent upon him to say to you now, before any further rash step is taken, that these duties the city government will discharge to the full, employing if need be its entire resources to that end."

Threat to Call Out Troops. "We live under a government of laws whose enforcement is committed into the hands of the Mayor. Conditions which you, yourselves, have indicated would be grossly violative of the laws and would convulse the civilized and orderly life of this community. We wish to make it unmistakably clear to you that to prevent that condition the full civil and military powers conferred by law upon the Mayor will be employed."

Fraye Comments on Warning. A copy of the Mayor and Mr. Straus's joint letter was read to Mr. Frayne at the Hotel Continental last night before he arrived. He first discussed the letter with the Mayor and repeated part of the speech made by President Gompers to the citizens' committee in the presence of the Mayor.

He accuses the Interborough. "Our position is that the company did violate the agreements of August 6 and 7 through a letter which they issued a few days after the settlement of the strike, saying to their men that they were not bound by the agreement. The 'master and servant' contract was another violation of the contract. They had the right to ask their non-union employees to sign those contracts, but they had no right to compel members of the union to sign them. We are satisfied there was a deliberate attempt on the part of the traction companies to destroy the agreements of August 6 and 7."
