ALLIES SMASH BIGGER GAP IN LINES ON SOMME

British Storm Redoubt and Capture Trenches on Front of 2,000 Yards.

COUNTER ATTACKS BY FOE ARE FUTILE

French Withstand Fierce Assaults and Extend Their Gains.

16 AEROPLANES ARE LOST TO GERMANS

Great Raid on Towns in Belgium Is Made by British.

London, Sept. 27.—Giving the Germans no rest, the victorious British and French troops are driving forward on the Somme front. Both armies won more victories to-day along the same front where yesterday they made their important progress. Every German attempt to turn the tide failed, all counter attacks being beaten back.

French Continue Drive.

The French swept the Germans still further back from Ramoncourt and penetrated the large St. Pierre Vaast Wood, directly east of Ramoncourt. They also captured a fortified wood east of Verdun, south of the Somme. The Germans counter attacked the French positions at Bouchemin, Thiépval, but the French dashed out to meet the attack, threw them back broken and took 200 prisoners and eight machine guns.

10,000 Prisoners Taken.

The prisoners taken in the last two days fighting bring the total for the operations of the last fortnight to 12,000.

Head to Head Fighting.

Further to the east the enemy was unable to advance. The fighting was a series of head to head fighting, with the British and French troops meeting in a series of hand to hand combats.

23D N. Y. TO RETURN HOME.

It Will Be Next Regiment Released From Border Duty.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 27.—The Twenty-third New York Infantry, now in the Somme front, will be the next regiment released from border duty, Gen. Funston indicated to-night after he had received notice from the War Department that 6,000 more men would be ordered to the border.

Dr. Ellender New Minister to E. S.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 27.—Dr. Ellender H. Ellender, Secretary of Foreign Affairs in the recent Cabinet, has been appointed Ecuadorian Minister to Washington.

CHEAPER FOOD ASKED BY GERMAN CENTRISTS

GREECE DECIDES TO JOIN THE ENTENTE

Cabinet to Resign, Leaving King Free to Act, London Hears.

London, Sept. 28 (Thursday).—The Greek Council of Ministers has decided in agreement with King Constantine upon military cooperation with the Entente Allies, says a Reuter despatch from Athens dated Wednesday. This is taken to mean that Greece is at last to enter the war.

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BERLIN FOOLED BY REPORT BREMEN HAS ARRIVED HERE

German Newspapers Enthusiastically Announce Docking of Submarine at New London, but She's Not at Any United States Port.

BERLIN, Sept. 27 (via London).—The Berlin newspapers to-day are acclaiming enthusiastically the arrival of the German submarine U-107 at New London, Conn. The Connecticut town has jumped to a point of prime interest, and the newspapers have found it necessary to describe its situation by the aid of maps.

\$50,000,000 LOAN TO CITY OF PARIS HERE

Kuhn, Loeb & Co. Arrange Transaction, Money Not to Be Used for War.

Kuhn, Loeb & Co. announced yesterday that they had arranged a loan of \$50,000,000 to the city of Paris. The entire amount is to be used for the relief of suffering in the French capital, the building of hospitals, the support of the wounded and the unemployed and the relief of widows and orphans.

WOMEN POLITICIANS IN ROW.

Wilson Supporters Break Up Meeting in Spokane.

A woman's non-partisan club for Wilson was formed in the meeting room and officers were chosen.

WESCOTT LOSES BY 16,000

Irish and Germans a Large Factor in "Farmer Orator's" Triumph.

New Jersey politicians figured yesterday that United States Senator James B. Wescott had lost by 16,000 votes in the Democratic contest for the nomination for United States Senator at Tuesday's statewide primaries was a rebuke to the national Administration, which set in motion the machinery designed to bring about the "farmer orator's" defeat.
