

ART WORLD READY FOR BUSY SEASON

Many Auctions and Exhibitions Planned for This City.

THEATRE RELICS ON SALE

Famous Italian Collection Is to Be Disposed of in New York.

The committee on the Le Brun traveling scholarship of the New York Chapter, A. I. A., announces that the scholarship for 1916 has been awarded to Austin Whittlesey of New York.

The collection formerly contained in the Davalloni Palace and the Villa Pia in Florence has been brought to this country and will be displayed at the public exhibition of these works of art which will be held at the American Art Galleries in Madison Square South.

John Sargent will be one of the contributors and the catalogue includes some of the most important drawings of the school of English art.

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An exhibition of contemporary American paintings is now on at the Montclair Art Museum. Included among the artists whose works are on view are Karl Anderson, Clifford Beal, George K. Chatterton, Randall Day, Robert Henri, Leon Krull, Allen Tucker and others.

R. W. Lenhard will show at the Pach Galleries beginning on Monday a collection of portraits. Mr. Lenhard is an American and studied with Cecilia Beaux, W. M. Chase and Emil Carlsen.

Richings, engravings and old woodcuts from the collection of Dr. William Hirsch of this city are to be sold on Thursday and Friday evenings at the Anderson Galleries.

Japanese prints in color will be sold at the Walpole Galleries on Tuesday evening. The collection is made up of the works of Hiroshige, Utamaro, Kōchōrō and Hashirake and includes broadsheets, surimono, triptychs, kakemono, diptychs and early prints in yellow tones.

The completed plans and models of the new Versailles by Carrere & Hastings are now on view at the National

Academy of Design at 215 West Fifty-seventh street. Russian peasant art work in embroidery, paintings and books may be seen at 67 East Fifty-fifth street, where the Gordon & Perutz Studios are situated.

Rare autograph collected by Hollis French, with additions from other sources, will be sold at the Anderson Galleries on November 9 in the afternoon. Among the manuscripts to be disposed of are some by Ainsworth, John Burroughs, Rodman Drake, Bret Harte, O. Henry, Theodore Roosevelt, Mrs. B. S. Warner, Charles Dudley Warner and Walt Whitman.

COULDN'T SEE CHILD, DOESN'T PAY WIFE

Dr. Bunker, Brooklyn Physician, Says She Kept Girl's Illness Secret.

Dr. Henry A. Bunker, a widely known medical practitioner of 184 Joralemon street, Brooklyn, in answering before Supreme Court Justice Pendleton yesterday the petition of his wife, Mrs. Marian W. Bunker, that he be punished for contempt in not paying back alimony, admitted that it was because his wife had not let him see his six-year-old daughter each week end, and because of her neglect the child's life was endangered.

On July 16 last Justice Pendleton signed a decree of separation and ordered that the physician was to pay his wife \$40 a week and Mrs. Bunker was to let her daughter, Elizabeth, visit the doctor on Saturdays and Sundays. In his affidavit Dr. Bunker declared that despite repeated promises he has not seen his daughter since.

Attached to Dr. Bunker's affidavits are statements from Dr. Henry H. Morton of the Long Island College Hospital, Dr. Burr Stearns of the House of St. Giles the Cripple, and other prominent surgeons that the child has a serious ailment known as catarrhal pyelitis, which is not unlikely to be fatal.

WERREN RATH SONGS GIVE MUCH DELIGHT

An Admirable Recital by One of the Foremost Artists.

GRIEG IN OWN TONGUE

Singer Moves His Audience by Delivery of Old English Lyrics.

Reinald Werrenrath, baritone, gave his first local recital in Aeolian Hall yesterday afternoon. He had a good audience, but there could have been a few more listeners.

Like all other singers he has his limitations and unlike many he knows them. His voice is one of splendid qualities, but it has a certain coarseness which is not pleasant to the demands of passionate utterance.

Mr. Werrenrath sang some Grieg songs in the original text and also some lyrics by Americans. He fetched a wide response in his singing, but he seemed never to be abroad. It was a truly artistic recital.
