

PRESIDENT BACK READY FOR WORK

Returns to Capital After Two Months to Prepare for Second Term.

MEXICO PROBLEM FIRST

Thousands Cheer Him as He Pays a Fleeting Visit to New York.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—President Wilson came back to Washington tonight, ready to take up waiting public problems and begin framing plans for his second term in the White House. He had been away two months.

A cheering crowd packed the railroad station and waited outside in a drizzle of rain to welcome the President. Mr. Wilson walked through the station with his hat off, bowing and smiling. Secretary Baker, Attorney-General Gregory, Private Secretary Tamm and Senator James McPherson were among those who greeted him.

The President was assured by Secretary Tamm that there had been no change in the result in California and that there was a chance of his capturing the electoral vote of Minnesota. The President, however, is not expected to indicate his attitude toward the outcome until it is formally conceded by the Republicans.

Mr. Wilson paid no attention to official business to-night, but to-morrow will be at his desk. The President will take up consideration of the Mexican situation promptly. He has been getting frequent reports from Secretary Lane, chairman of the American section of the Mexican-American Commission meeting at Atlantic City, and will now give the question detailed study.

IN TOWN 29 MINUTES.

Thousands Cheer President on His Fleeting Visit.

President Wilson spent twenty nine minutes in Manhattan yesterday afternoon. Though he had desired to pass quickly through the city his wish was not fulfilled. He was met by a throng of his automobile from the foot of West Seventy-ninth street, where he landed from the yacht Mayflower, to the Pennsylvania station by a motorcade of thousands who cheered and waved hats or handkerchiefs.

The Mayflower arrived at 1 o'clock in the afternoon from Hoboken, where she had picked up the President and his party on the previous evening. The presence of the yacht in the North River immediately after the election was a sign that thousands on Riverside Drive.

By 2 o'clock three thousand persons were assembled between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-third streets along the river, waiting for the President to embark from the Mayflower. There were on board the yacht with the President Mrs. Wilson, Miss Helen Woodrow Hones, his cousin, and Miss Margaret W. Wilson, his daughter.

The President's car was preceded by an automobile with local detectives and by two motorcycle policemen. Following it were the cars of the secret service team and of Chief Flynn. As the President's car started up the steep hill at Seventy-ninth street it was greeted by a second, and immediately several enthusiastic cheerers.

On the station platform Col. E. M. House, the President's friend and adviser, was waiting. There also was Charles R. Crane of Chicago, Gordon Lathrop, Col. House's son-in-law, and several women. Mrs. Wilson's sister and brother also were on the platform and accompanied the party to Washington.

Alderman John F. McCourt, in whose district is the Pennsylvania station, greeted the President with "Thank God, you were re-elected." He asked the President to meet his son, Robbie McCourt, 14, at the Pennsylvania station, who said he was happy that his father had been re-elected.

Party Conferences Are Expected to Precede Manoeuvres for Control.

G. O. P. CLAIMS MAJORITY
