

BOLDT AND SCHWAB ARE NOW "DOCTORS" Cornell's Old Graduates Slip a D. L. and a D. D. to George and Charley.

OUT TO RAISE \$100,000 Alumni Will Spend One Week Soliciting Subscriptions.

He is Dr. George C. Boldt now, Cornell alumnus, meeting in the Waldorf Astoria last night, conferred the degree of Doctor of Laws after Franklin Matthews, the chairman, had presented the proposal of the Waldorf as "the greatest Cornellian in captivity—our adopted son." Charles M. Schwab won a D. D.—in this case Doctor of Donations—by virtue of the fact that he had set the alumni's monetary mobilization campaign going with a check for \$250. Officially Cornell has never conferred an honorary degree, but the old grads determined to take things in their own hands. Nearly 500 gathered for the first of two weekly suppers, and after "Dan" Reed, line coach of the football team, had told them of some of the university instructors are eating only one meal a day nearly ten hours during the week of December 18 to soliciting subscriptions. A nationwide campaign is on to obtain a total annual pledge of \$100,000, of which the New York city alumni are expected to give \$40,000. Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, the university president, said that the two great needs are liberal endowments for professors and for the erection of new dormitories. "We want to command the services of the best men in the world," said Dr. Schurman. "There is great danger that we may lose for systematic training and scientific research the best brains. Many men are deterred from college professorships by the hardships and discouragements they see in the way."

\$379,151,701 ASKED FOR BY NAVY IN 1918 House Sub-Committee Begins Work on Record Department Appropriations.

ARMOR CONTRACTS LET Bethlehem and Carnegie Companies Each Receive Half of Work.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—When Secretary Daniels was awarding contracts today for armor plate for four battleships authorized at the last session of Congress the appropriation sub-committee of the House Naval Committee began work on the 1918 estimates, the heaviest in American history, to be presented to Congress this winter. The Navy Department's 1918 figures contemplate construction of half of the ships yet to be built in the great three year programme, and show total appropriations of \$379,151,701, or more than \$66,000,000 in excess of the record total appropriated last summer. Contracts for the armor plate which will go on the Colorado, Maryland, Washington and West Virginia were awarded to the Bethlehem and Carnegie steel companies, each receiving half of the work. Despite the unprecedented European demand, the prices offered were approximately the same as those paid three years ago. The figures are: Armor plate, class A-1, 14,472 tons to each company at \$450 a ton to Bethlehem and \$425 to Carnegie; 830 tons of A-2 class to each at \$415 to Bethlehem and \$420 to Carnegie; and 493 tons class B at \$446 a ton to Bethlehem and \$460 to Carnegie. Construction to Begin Soon. The department estimates that for the beginning construction of three battleships, one battle cruiser, three scout cruisers, sixteen destroyers, four fleet submarines, fourteen coast submarines, one submarine tender and one destroyer tender. Rear Admiral Strauss, chief of ordnance, explained an increase of \$1,500,000 in his estimates for fleet ammunition. He said the cost of projectiles and other ordnance material had increased that much since Congress provided \$11,000,000 for the purpose last year. He also outlined the Department's scheme for buying and storing in navy yards guns and ammunition with which to equip merchant steamers as naval auxiliaries in time of war. More than \$2,000,000 for this purpose was appropriated last year, and this year the Department seeks \$1,500,000 for ammunition. Admiral Strauss said the naval gun factory was now producing torpedoes, the first deliveries exceeding in cost the prices quoted by private manufacturers. It is expected that the factory will get its costs considerably below the commercial rate with its next delivery. Production to Be Cheaper. At the Newport station, where the bulk of the navy's torpedoes are produced, the Admiral said the cost of production was from \$1,000 to \$2,100 below the best prices obtainable from private manufacturers. The ammunition ship, for which Secretary Daniels today approved plans, is the first craft of the kind ever designed for the navy. She will have a displacement of 10,000 tons with cargo of powder and shells. Secretary Daniels said today he had arranged to confer with representatives of the Electric Boat Company in an effort to seek modifications of their pending submarine bids. This company offered to construct twenty-four submarines, deliveries to begin within twenty-five months as proposed at much higher cost to have the deliveries begin within fifteen months. The Department is determined to place the submarine construction on not more than a twenty-two-month basis, and will urge the Electric company to agree to this.

DRUG FIGHTERS ORGANIZE Joint Legislative Committee Elects Chairman and Clerk. ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 20.—The joint legislative committee appointed last spring to investigate the habit-forming drug traffic with a view to recommending regulatory legislation organized today by electing Senator George H. Whitney of Mechanicville, chairman, and Edward L. Lansing of Rensselaer, clerk. The first public hearing will be held in New York December 4 and hearings will be held in Albany and Buffalo, it was announced.
