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ELMAN THE SOLOIST AT PHILHARMONIC

Russian Violinist Plays Beethoven's D Major Concerto to Audience's Delight.

Mischa Elman, Russian violinist, was the soloist with the Philharmonic Society at its concert in Carnegie Hall last night. He played the solo part in Beethoven's D major concerto.

Following a marvellously finished performance of the concerto the violinist received ten or more recalls. The programme began with Haydn's G major symphony, "Militaire," which was played with a very appropriate spirit by the orchestra.
