

COLUMBIA HUNTING FOR ANY DISLOYALTY

Trustees Name Committee to Examine Character of All Teaching.

DR. BUTLER KEEPS HOUSE

Plan to Secure It for Faculty Club Disapproved—Year's Budget \$4,432,527.

Aroused to action by reports that have reached their ears, the trustees of Columbia University appointed a committee yesterday to make a searching inquiry into the character of the teaching in the sixty or more departments of the university.

The fact that the committee was appointed with this inquiry as its only object indicates that well substantiated reports have been spread through the university that such teachings have been going on. The resolution authorizing the investigation says the special committee is appointed "to inquire and ascertain whether doctrines which are subversive of or tend to the violation or disregard of the Constitution or laws of the United States or of the State of New York, or which tend to encourage a spirit of disloyalty to the Government of the United States, or the principles upon which it is founded, are taught or disseminated by officers of the university."

The committee consists of William Barclay Parsons, chairman of the board; John B. Pine, clerk of the board; Francis S. Bangs, George L. Ingraham and Stephen Baker, chairman of the committee on education, legal affairs and finance, and President Nicholas Murray Butler.

The trustees adopted resolutions pledging the loyal support of the university to the Government in national defense and approving the action of the President in organizing the university for national service.

SLAYER FREE BY AID OF MISS SHAINWALD

After 20 Years Charles Homer Is Paroled to Begin Life as Poultry Raiser.

Miss Marion Shainwald of 667 Madison avenue, daughter of Ralph I. Shainwald, president of the Standard Paper Company, went to Sing Sing prison yesterday and escorted back to New York a man who has spent twenty years in confinement under a life sentence for murder.

He is Charles Homer, found guilty when he was 19 years old of killing an innocent man in a quarrel over a young woman whose affections both claimed. He has been a model prisoner and is now free on parole.

Miss Shainwald is a member of the Women's National Prison Auxiliary Association, and because of her services in helping ex-convicts to get jobs and "go straight" she is one of the three women elected honorary members of Sing Sing's Mutual Welfare League. She met Homer two or three summers ago at North Creek in the Adirondacks, where he was a cook in a prison camp, and was impressed, she said yesterday, by his gentleness and wholesome ways. She promised to help him get work when he was eligible for parole, and yesterday she made good.

Through her friends Miss Shainwald had found five opportunities. He had his choice of entering the stock department of an automobile factory, of gardening, of raising poultry on a farm at some distance from New York and of two other vocations. He chose chicken farming, and last night in his new suit of clothes he left the city to begin work to-day.
