

U.S. ASKS CHINA TO END INTERNAL ROW

War With Germany Called Secondary to Political Unity.

HOPE REVOLT NEAR OVER Lansing Denies Reports Money Has Been Furnished to Revolutionists.

PEKIN, June 7.—Dr. Paul S. Reinsch, the American Minister, today handed the foreign office the following communication from Washington: "The United States Government learns with the most profound regret of the discussion in China and expresses a sincere desire that tranquility and political coordination be forthwith established."

Hope for Peace Seen. WASHINGTON, June 7.—The Chinese Legation here re-established telegraphic communication today with the Government at Peking, which is taken as an indication in diplomatic circles that plans of compromise between the Chinese Government and the revolutionary army leaders are progressing.

\$24,000 A MINUTE RED CROSS OBJECT

Every City in Country Given Quota in Campaign for \$100,000,000.

CALL TO CORPORATIONS Special Dividends Urged, Payable to Society Only at Option of Recipient.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Plans are being worked out by the War Council of the Red Cross, of which Henry P. Davison is chairman, for raising a \$100,000,000 war fund.

The fund will be raised by a campaign in the week beginning June 18. No money will be accepted before that date. Thousands of teams throughout the country have been making preliminary canvasses, and at a signal on June 18 these teams are to begin on the great nationwide drive for charity ever undertaken. Twenty-four thousand dollars must be obtained each minute if the goal is to be reached.

Mr. Davison and his associates in that week are to work harder than any men charged with an undertaking of this sort ever worked before. Consulting themselves as a board of strategy, they have appointed the \$100,000,000 to be raised among the States and the machinery organized in each State will be expected to produce its quota.

Similarly the State committees have apportioned specific sums to each of the cities in their respective States. In each city a campaign manager has been appointed. Definite personal responsibility, expressed in a nationwide organization of business men and women, will be the basis.
