

MRS. HYMAN HAS ACCUSERS ARRESTED

12 Persons, Charged by Her With Being in Plot, Taken in One Swoop.

SHE MAKES "CONFESSION"

Says When "Blowup" Came They Left Her With Less Than \$100.

Mrs. Ray Hyman, charged with having defrauded people of their savings on promise of getting 50 per cent. interest a month on their investments, grew weary yesterday of the role of the accused and assumed that of the accuser.

As a result twelve persons are under arrest, another is expected to surrender to the authorities this morning and eight more may be seized soon.

Assistant United States Attorney Garrett Cotter appeared against the prisoners, who were held for examination on June 29. Their bail was fixed by United States Commissioner Hitchcock at \$2,500 each, except in the case of Mrs. Nellie Grossman of 1495 East Eighty-ninth street, Brooklyn, who was paroled to care for her children.

The other prisoners were Edward M. Grossman, this woman's husband, who himself caused Mrs. Hyman's arrest last week; Samuel Grossman, his father; his brother-in-law, George Leavy; Leonard Blatt, Sol Simon, Mrs. Ray Simon, Frank Starkman, Barney Glanrock, Harry Shiffer and Harry Ehrmann, two Broadway clothiers, and Mrs. Martha Ehrmann.

Wants Company in Jail.

Mrs. Hyman said yesterday that she is willing to go to jail if necessary, but she is determined to have lots of company there. Some of the persons accused were instrumental in putting her into bankruptcy and later caused her arrest, she alleges that they were parties with her in a scheme to defraud and she supplements this with a statement that certain of them went so far as to invite her to get into a rowboat at Oyster Bay last Decoration Day and then deliberately upset the boat for the purpose of drowning her.

She declares that after she had been rescued by lifeguards and revived in the midst of her companions she discovered that she had been defrauded of \$3,000. After a night spent in the home of one of these persons early this month she also asserts that \$6,700 was mysteriously missing from her purse.

On Sunday, June 10, she asserts, Edward M. Grossman, her former agent, and some of his relatives called upon her at Mount Vernon, and demanded \$250,000 on threat of a "frameup." Two days later, she asserts, three persons took her on an automobile ride and endeavored to induce her to leave the State, saying that the police were after her.

Scheme Hatched April 1.

Mrs. Hyman says the scheme to part fools from their money was hatched on April 1 last. Instead of having been the principal, she declares, she was but a tool employed by a great ring of persons, telling others people how much money they were getting from her and persuading them to turn over their savings. She in turn, she explains, was to turn over the bulk of the profits to the members of the ring.

The persons arrested yesterday were all charged with aiding and participating in the concealment of assets in bankruptcy proceedings. The warrant on which they were taken was issued on application of Mr. Palmer. Mrs. Hyman asserts that when the blowup came, as it was bound to, with the other parties to the scheme left her with less than \$100, having themselves made a practical cleanup of her business.

The arrests came in the midst of an examination which was being conducted before United States Commissioner Alexander Gilchrist in the interest of Mrs. Hyman's receiver, Morris Frank. Most of the prisoners were gathered in the room when Mr. Palmer called several deputy marshals, who served the warrants.

Intimation Is Given.

An intimation that something was afoot to happen had been given when the younger Grossman was being questioned about his dealings with Mrs. Hyman. Mr. Palmer asked him about the boat episode, and the witness replied that although a member of the Decoration Day party he had not been in the boat with Mrs. Hyman when it upset. He was asked about several other features of the woman's statement, all of which he denied having had any part in.

Mr. Palmer and Mr. Sandler will ask Commissioner Gilchrist for subpoenas directing each of the new prisoners to submit to examination in an effort to trace the missing fortune that is said to have been wanted by several hundred creditors. The bank accounts of all will be probed in an effort to locate sums which the "interest Queen" is claiming were given to them, and efforts will be made to compel them to make restitution to her bankrupt estate.

SALVARSAN TO BE MADE HERE JULY 1 Brooklyn Plant Will Supply Enough for Needs of Whole Country. Salvarsan, manufactured commercially in the United States for the first time, will be sold in this country by July 1 at a price materially under the retail rates for the imported product even before the war and probably more than a third less than the present price. Shipping charges, an import duty of 20 per cent., royalties and other expenses which have entered into the price heretofore will be eliminated by the production of salvarsan at a plant and laboratory in Brooklyn now nearly completed which will be able to supply the needs of this country and even export to South and Central America.

HERBERT PLAY FOR WEBER.

Joe Weber announced yesterday that his first production for next season will be a musical comedy entitled "Her Regiment" for which Victor Herbert is now writing the score at his summer camp in the Adirondacks. As joint stars for the piece Mr. Weber has engaged Caroline White, lately prima donna of the Chicago-Philadelphia Grand Opera Company, and Adelphi Brian. Dallas Wolford will have the comedy role.
