FOOD REBELS REVEAL DISSENT TO CONGRESS

Delegation of Legislative Power to President Secretly Opposed.

MEMBERS ARE TIMOROUS Senators and Representatives Await Reaction Among the People.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The tide of opposition to what virtually amounts to the delegation of the legislative power to the Executive, thereby establishing almost autocratic government for purposes of the war, as evidenced by the provisions of the food bill, is slowly but surely rising in Congress.

War Hysteria is Intimated. "The country," said one Senator of conspicuous attainments to-day, "wants to win the war, but the wild idea just now that the President, whether he be good or bad, must as its leader have these extraordinary powers in order to win the war, there is nobody who does not want to see the war, but a great many people will before long get over this idea that to win the war it is necessary for a President to ask for such extraordinary powers and for Congress to accord them to him."

But in the minds of many Senators and Representatives is the conviction that in less than a year a reaction will set in among the people. They believe the wild idea will slowly gain ground that to win a war for democracy it is not necessary to have autocracy in a republic.

New South Wales Legislator Dies in Bombay Hospital. BOMBAY, India, July 1.—A New South Wales legislator named Winchcombe, who was a passenger on the Peninsular and Oriental Line steamship Mongolia, which sank with the loss of twenty-three passengers after striking a mine on June 23 off Bombay, died in a hospital here to-day.
