Citizens of Bisbee Drive 1,193 Strike Inciters to New Mexico.

SITUATION IS CRITICAL

Appeal Is Made to President Wilson and U. S. Military Authorities.

ENTIRE WEST AROUSED

German Money Operating to Embarrass Government War Industries.

Nebraska Bars I. W. W. From Kansas

LINCOLN, Neb., July 12.—Members of the Industrial Workers of the World are coming to Nebraska in large numbers, according to police officials. A band of fifty arrived on a freight train last night, expecting to stop here, but the police compelled them to continue their journey.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—From the Canadian border to Mexico city, State and military authorities are on the alert to-night to repress the series of internal disorders that have been precipitated by the Industrial Workers of the World.

President Wilson earlier had been troubled, in a message sent to him through the Department of Labor by Federal Ministers John McBride and G. W. P. Hunt, to take prompt action to stop the deportation of strikers from Bisbee and Douglas, both in Arizona.

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Armed Citizens Watch Trains

Meanwhile, packed in cattle and box cars, 1,193 members of the Industrial Workers of the World are being taken from Bisbee under the rifles of a Sheriff's posse and the threat of three machine guns and bundled along to Columbus, Minn. It is stated that they will be placed under the protection of the guard of soldiers of the United States army. Three women were in the herded party, which was corralled in the baseball park at Bisbee preliminary to the deportation.

German Influences Charged

It is openly charged that the Industrial Workers of the World, under the influence of German suggestion, are operating to "embarrass the United States Government" by disturbing labor and industry and curtailing production. The Sheriff at Bisbee, in a formal statement, indorses these charges, and declares that the roundup will be 100 per cent. effective to the end that no member of the order will remain in his district when the work is completed.

STOKES TO FORM NEW PARTY

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BRITAIN WILLING TO DISCUSS WAR AIMS

LONDON, July 12.—Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of Blockade and Parliamentary Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the British Government had informed the Russian Government of its willingness to enter into a discussion looking to the possible revision of the war aims of the Entente Allies.

NURSE INDICTED AS MURDERESS

Arrested as Slayer of Woman, Supposed Suicide, in Brookline, Mass.

DREHMAN, Mass., July 12.—Miss Harriet A. Varney, a hospital nurse, was indicted to-day for the murder of Mrs. Pauline Keyes at Brookline on June 12. Immediately after the jury reported Miss Varney was arraigned before Judge Kesting, charged with first degree murder. She pleaded not guilty and was held without bail for trial.

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
