

SUPPORT IS ASKED IN CROSBY MOVEMENT

Livingston Sure He Will Lead Fight on Tammany if Called. PETITIONS CIRCULATING Citywide Committee Likely to Be Organized During Week.

From an unnamed source in which he has "faith and confidence," Jacob A. Livingston, chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of Kings county, said yesterday that he had "positive information" that Supreme Court Justice Crosby would head the anti-Tammany forces if "strong enough sentiment in documentary form" is shown by the voters for the Brooklyn jurist.

The leader of the Twenty-second Assembly district refused to answer if Mr. Crosby himself was the source of information. Mr. Crosby also declined to make any comment on Livingston's statement, which follows:

"I have positive information that if the strong sentiment which exists in this greater city for Judge Crosby to lead the anti-Tammany movement as a candidate for Mayor asserts itself strong enough in documentary form in the shape of signatures to the petitions which are now about to be circulated he will respond to the call.

"Committees are ready in every county of this city to obtain the sentiment. These petitions will be given to the executive members, county committees and others who will be in the movement. They will also be left at the various clubhouses and other places."

Although he had promised to have organized by last week, the citywide Crosby committee, Mr. Livingston said last night that it might not be made up until some time this week. Politicians vented the suggestion that Livingston's formal statement indicated that he intended to press Crosby for head of the fusion ticket or to use him as a means of driving Mitchell out of the race.

Following is the text of the Crosby petition to be distributed throughout the city: "We, the undersigned, believe that in the approaching Mayoralty election the only hope of obtaining an honest and efficient administration and of preventing the control of the city government falling into Tammany's hands is to nominate for Mayor one who not only can bring to his candidacy the support of the independent voters but also command the undivided allegiance of the entire Republican party of Greater New York."

"We believe that the Hon. James C. Crosby of the borough of Brooklyn more than any one else by his well known fearlessness and integrity, his splendid record as Police Commissioner, his administrative ability as Metropolitan Attorney, his services as a jurist and his absolute independence in matters political would bring every Republican and independent voter in Greater New York to his support and thus insure the success of a non-partisan, anti-Tammany administration of the affairs of our city."

"We therefore earnestly request that he consent to become a candidate for Mayor of the city of New York and pledge to him our earnest support."

MIDLAND'S NEW HOME. Salisbury Links Will Be Used by Golf Club.

Since its formation nearly ten years ago the Midland Golf Club has had the unusual distinction of being the only club in the United States and Metropolitan golf sections which did not have its own links. Last year the club did not even have a course on which its members could play. But now, while still without its own course, the club can boast of a finer club house and a better eighteen hole links than are possessed by some of the better known and wealthier clubs.

By arrangement with the Salisbury Plains Corporation, owners of the public Salisbury Links at Meadowbrook, L. I., the Midland is comfortably installed there. The Salisbury Links club room and a 6,200 yard course of unusual interest give the club everything it desires. Club members share the links with the public, but the contract is so long that there never is any congestion.

On Saturdays and Sundays the Midland hold prize competitions to which the public is sometimes admitted on payment of a small fee. Membership in the club has increased rapidly since the Salisbury Links furnished the club with a home.


