

EXEMPTION BOARDS, STORMED, LOCKED UP IN POLICE STATIONS

LIST OF CITY NUMBERS DRAWN, NONE OVER 4,696

Read Across Lines, Not Down, to Ascertain Order of Selection—First 550 Numerals Likely to be Called.

THE SUN prints herewith a list of all the serial numbers for New York city, showing the order in which they were drawn. The highest number is 4,696 because no exemption district in the city has more than that number of registered men. At Washington 10,500 numbers were drawn for the reason that somewhere in the country there is an exemption district where 10,500 men are registered.

But all numbers higher than the number of men registered in your district are considered blanks by your board. For example, if your number is 458 and you live in a district where 2,520 are registered you will be the second man called. The first six numbers drawn were 258, 2,522, 9,613, 4,532, 10,218, 458. All except 258 and 458 thus are blanks in your district. Since all above 4,696 are blanks in every New York city district, they have been omitted by THE SUN. As there are few districts in the State outside of the city which have a higher number than 4,696, the list will prove generally useful.

As the quota of men to be drafted from each exemption district has not been determined, it is impossible to say exactly how many men will be called for examination. As twice as many men as are actually needed to be called up in each district, it is safe to guess that in most districts men who hold the first 550 numbers in the following list, possibly more than that, will be called. That does not mean that they will be drafted. By physical examination and exemption for other reasons many will be weeded out.

Registrars Will Here Find Information Valuable in Calculating Call.

SYSTEM IS EXPLAINED

Only One Quota in Town Has Total of 4,696 Men on List.

The number of men registered in each of the 189 local exemption districts in New York city is given below. It will pay any registrant to find out the number in his district for it will help him to calculate his chance of being called for the draft examination.

Men wanting to know their serial numbers were telephoning the Mayor's committee all day. It was able to help them in three official copies here. It can't be done. The draft is safe.

One who had broken his up-date vacation in two days in New York and got his serial number reported that he had inquired at his police station, the patrolman on his beat and several exemption board officers without finding out where the board for his district had its abode. As he was one of the few inquirers who knew the numbers of his Assembly and election district, the Mayor's committee was able to set him on the right track.

Organize Intelligence Bureau. The committee is forming a "bureau of intelligence" which may be used to enlighten the registrants in subsequent phases of the draft. Among yesterday's plans was this from a man whose temper had been frayed.

As soon as the names of the men to be called for examination by the local boards are known—it cannot be repeated too often that they are not known until the local exemption board will be called—the City Record will print them. Probably the list will be printed in the City Record. To Draw Double Number. When the Governor announces the quota of each district the next step of the local exemption board will be to count out from the serial list in the order drawn in Washington, enough names to make twice the district quota. In other words, if the district quota is 250 the names corresponding to the first 700 numbers drawn in Washington yesterday will be counted out. The names will be sent ordering him to report to the board for physical examination. One-third of the men will be asked to report on the sixth day, the following day, and the rest on the sixth day and the rest on the seventh day. They must report on the day specified. This means that all the physical examinations will be held on the sixth day. Most of the boards have only one physician member, and how the work is to be done in three days no one knows, but that's what the regulations say.

Whether or not a man who is called claims exemption he must present himself for physical examination. From the day on which he notices that he is called he must do the same in seven days in which to file a claim of exemption or discharge. The grounds for exemption are specified and the affidavits supporting a claim must be obtained from a doctor. The man who expects to be called need not bother his head about that now, however. Having ascertained his serial number he can get ready for it. The local boards are now in the hands of routine, which, it may be remarked, are by no means few.

City on One Level. The district which embrace that part of the city in which the better clubs and a large part of the better class residences are situated included other social clubs as well as the members of the penance panamas, sporting the ribbon of exclusive college and social organizations, waited patiently in line with fellow citizens whose heads and other accessories were less aristocratic.

The numbers concealed in that slowly diminishing pile of capsules before the two clerks in the Capitol at Washington brought the district list at 82, 82, at Headquarters. On the lower East Side there was less superficial social distinction. In that section the districts are smaller and generally composed by a single residential racial group. There was more excitement in East Broadway and Hester Street than along Central Park West where the registration was held.

Trick headquarters had more difficulty in keeping the eager seekers after the magic numbers in line, but there was not a single case of disorder. It was observed, of ill temper.

District 93, with headquarters at 229 East Broadway, had most of its lists torn to pieces by the excited crowd, and the same thing was narrowly avoided in several other districts in that section. It was finally found better to pass the applicants in line before a desk where a clerk or one of the members of the board looked up each name from the original cards. This method was pursued with good results at the headquarters of District 105 at 82, 82, at Hester and Norfolk streets, and at other places.

Many of the boards on the East Side closed their quarters at the beginning of the afternoon. On Sabbath, Nos. 94, 107 and 93 were all closed early in the evening, and where the members of the board and the majority of the registrants were away, no numbers were given out after night-fall.
