

ELEVEN BURNED, 2 HURT, 12 BURNED

Three Men and Woman Lose Lives by Stepping Into Sand Hole at Keanburg.

DIVER BREAKS HIS NECK Physicians and Others Injured When Pulmotor Explodes and Scatters Acid.

Nine men, a child and one woman were drowned and two men seriously hurt Saturday and Sunday while bathing in the vicinity of New York. More than a dozen others were badly burned at Keanburg, N. J., on Saturday when a pulmotor exploded and scattered acid over physicians and others who were trying to resuscitate four persons who had drowned in Raritan Bay.

Several hundred pleasure seekers at Island Beach, Staten Island, last night were shocked by a fire which broke out in a boat, and a child lost his life after tumbling from a barge.

Frank Pristie, 19 years old, of 17 North street, Newark, met with a similar accident when he dived off a pier near Totterville, Staten Island. He was rescued by companions and taken to the Staten Island Hospital suffering from a broken neck. He is expected to live.

Dr. Charles Palmer of Keanburg and Dr. Charles M. McConnell of New Monmouth were notified and hurried to the beach, and a pulmotor was used. Esther Isaacs, the daughter of one of the organizers of the Emergency Hospital at Keanburg, Miss Isaacs was rescued and taken to the hospital.

Frank Hurstling, 45 years old, a tailor, of 194 Cypress avenue, Brooklyn, was drowned off Rockaway Point yesterday when he went to the rescue of a small son who had been carried out by the tide. Hurstling's body was recovered and he was taken to the White Cross Emergency Hospital, but died within a few minutes. Other bathers rescued the boy.

A. L. Black, 22 years old, a sailor, and W. Beart, 33, a fireman, both members of a crew of a Dutch steamship lying at a North River pier, were drowned during the storm yesterday afternoon when a squall capsized the boat in which they were rowing across the river at about 7 o'clock.

Paul Cheski, 2 years old, who lived with his parents on the barge Sigmond, was killed at Pier G of the Chelsea Valley Railroad in the Morris Canal gap, tumbled from the barge last night and drowned. The body was recovered.

Patrolman Edward Machel of the Herbert street station, who was passing a part of his vacation yesterday in the somewhat regular fashion of trying to stop a free flight when one of the combatants shot in a way the left eye. He was taken to the Eastern District Hospital. Three of the billigents were arrested.

Machel was walking in Morgan avenue at the corner of Beadle street he ran into the war zone. In the fighting were many Poles. One of them, Stanislaw Dongrowsky, of 42 Driggs avenue, shot the policeman and two others, who said they were Michael Hinters of 58 Terry avenue and John Sowdanas of 110 Morgan avenue, are charged with supplying upon the policeman after he had fallen to the sidewalk from the effect of his wound. Reserves from the Herbert street station hurried along and arrested all three men.

2 NEGROES WOUNDED IN TENEMENT FRAY

Row Over Hat Brings Bullets Through Martin's Window.

Half a dozen young men became helterskelter early yesterday afternoon in front of the apartment occupied by George Martin, a negro, on the ground floor of the tenement at 183 East Ninety-seventh street. One of them threw his hat through Martin's window, and when Martin threw it back demanded that the negro give him \$100, claiming that the hat had been damaged. Martin refused to give them the money.

Knights of the East 14th street station, who heard the shots, arrested Robert Foley, 18, of 121 East 165th street, who was locked up, charged with the crime of firing the shot at the attack on Martin's tenement.

Justice demanded that they be purged of all responsibility for the name of the desire of the Wojciechowski to get rid of it. 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OLD NAMES FOR NEW! NEW NAMES FOR OLD!

Mr. German Becomes "German"; Pfingsthorn Just Plain Thorn.

The desire of Americans to escape an embarrassment they feel is now thrust upon them by a family name of German origin is strikingly revealed in applications being made daily to the courts for leave to discard old names for new. Records in the County Clerk's office in Brooklyn disclose that more than 100 changes of name have been authorized in that borough since April 6, the day that Congress declared the existence of a state of war by act of Germany.

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ROOSEVELT BACKS MITCHELL CANDIDACY

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RESENTMENT OVER HIGH PRICES GROWS

Restlessness Follows Economic Practices Practised at Instance of U. S. Agencies.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—A certain restlessness and a feeling of resentment at the failure of economic practices adopted by them at the instance of Mr. Hoover and other Government agencies to bring down prices has been discovered by the national committee of patriotic and defense societies, of which George Wharton Pepper is chairman. An investigation of food conditions made through leaders of the different societies represented on the committee shows, the committee says, that the price of bread is higher than it was before the campaign begun by Mr. Hoover, and that "seemingly neither the Government, the public nor any one else except the flour bakers, have profited by this move."
