FLANDERS DRIVE TO GO ON TO-DAY

French Make Gain While British Retake Posts on Infantry Hill. GUN-FIRE INCREASING Clearing Weather Promises to Give Airplane Chance to Resume Activity.

London, Aug. 4.—A pronounced increase in artillery fire on the fighting front and clearing weather, which continued to-morrow will make it possible to use airplanes effectively, afford strong indications that the battle of Flanders is about to resume.

Following are the official reports: British (Day).—Our troops retook several important positions, including a portion of the trench east of Monchy le Preux, into which the enemy forced his way on Thursday night.

On both banks of the Verdun (Verdun sector), the artillery of each side was active. Two attempts made by German infantry to occupy our positions in the Argonne were repulsed with great loss.

GERMANS CAPTURE BLACKS

German (Day) Army Group of Crown Prince Rupprecht.—On the battle front in Flanders quiet prevailed since the night of the 3rd, the influence of rain in the course of the night the artillery fire increased to greater violence at intervals.

Nation Steeled to Win, Says King George

LONDON, Aug. 4.—King George, writing to the Lord Mayor of London thanking him for his reaffirmation of loyalty and expression of confidence in the efficiency of the fighting forces, says: "Three years of war, with all they have meant to every home in the British Empire, have served to weld more closely than ever the bonds of unity and steel the hearts of the whole nation in their firm resolve to secure the sacred principles of justice, freedom and humanity."

BILLY KYNE, 19, ONCE DEAF, BUT ENLISTS

Son of Manager of Murray's Shames All Slackers. Patrick Kyne, manager of Murray's restaurant, has a son whose record ought to be a model for all young men. He is only 19 years of age, but has the minimum conscription age, but so anxious to fight that when he was rejected by a medical commission because of deafness he was heartbroken.

The young man, whose name is William Gerald Kyne, formerly was in the Seventy-first Infantry Regiment, National Guard, and saw several months of service on the Mexican border last year. When the regiment was called out for duty in the present war he was the happiest man in New York when he was called to the front.

KAISER CONGRATULATES

RUSSIAN DRIVE FOR CROSS ZBROZ

Morale of Troops in Field Continues to Improve Despite Political Crisis. DISORDER IN PETROGRAD Armed Men Rob Senate Building of Antiques Valued at \$750,000.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 4.—Despite the tremendous political upheaval here, which resulted yesterday in the resignations of Premier Kerensky and the Cabinet, followed by the decision of all but two of the members to remain at their posts, the morale of the forces in the field continues to improve.

Teutonic troops who crossed the Zbroz, north of Husiatyn, have been driven back over the river, while in southern Bukovina a real battle is in progress. The German army has occupied the town of Watra and between the Pruth and the Dniester the Russians are still retiring eastward.

CABAL FOR MONARCHY

It Is Called "Holy Ux Russia," Says Despatch. Announcement of the discovery of an active monarchist organization calling themselves "The Holy Ux Russia," and the fact that an appeal has been published by prominent Socialists calling upon their comrades to support the project, which is being organized to save the revolution are contained in a despatch to the Jewish Daily Forward yesterday from its Petrograd correspondent.

LANDTAG ADJOURNS

WAR TAX BILLIS UP ANOTHER \$4,790,000

Senate Finance Committee Will Report Revised Measure To-morrow. INTERESTING SUMMARY OF ITEMS COMPARED WITH THOSE IN HOUSE'S DRAFT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The revised tax bill which will be reported to the Senate Monday by the Finance Committee will raise \$2,026,798,000, instead of \$2,022,000,000, according to final official estimates completed to-night, or about \$125,000,000 more than the House provided and \$331,698,000 more than the Senate committee planned to raise before the new war estimates were submitted to Congress.

ROOT BACK WITH FAITH IN RUSSIA

Believes They Will Create Great Free, Self-Governing Democracy. SPEEDING TO CAPITAL Mission's Task Hampered by Russian Americans Who Malign This Country.

A PACIFIC PORT, Aug. 4.—Faith in the ability of Russia to overcome her difficulties and perpetuate a great and free democracy was expressed to-day by Elihu Root, head of the American mission to Russia, in a speech delivered at a luncheon here in honor of the return of the mission. The members of the party landed here late last night. After the luncheon to-day they boarded a special train which will carry them to Washington.

Mr. Russell said the task of new Russia was greatly handicapped by German influences and the ceaseless activity of the German propagandists. "Most of the trouble, however, has been caused by the Russians naturalized Americans who have returned to Russia since the outbreak of the revolution," he said, and added that Russians from the United States are spreading the report throughout the country that America had entered the war from greed.

"These propagandists," he continued, "who pretend to have a superior knowledge of American conditions and American motives, inform their native countrymen that the Government of the United States is more conservative than the old regime at Petrograd."
