

RIGA'S FALL LAID TO TREASON HERE

Russell Arraigns La Follette and 'Crew in Congress' as Arch Traitors.

SOCIALISTS ARE LOYAL Darrow Denies That Rich Men's Sons Are Dodging War Service.

Declaring that if the thin line of Russian soldiers guarding Moscow gives way the 153 German divisions stretching from Riga to Rumania will turn to the western front and with the 123 divisions now there will overrun France, take Paris and leave America to bear the brunt and burden of the war.

PRESIDENT DROPS IN AT A THEATRE HERE

He and Mrs. Wilson Cheered for Two Minutes by Audience at Belasco.

The President and Mrs. Wilson, together with several members of the latter's family, made a rather unexpected trip to the Belasco Theatre last night to attend a performance of "Polly With a Past" and received tremendous applause from crowds inside and outside the theatre.

When the Chief Magistrate appeared in a lower box on the right side of the house, Mrs. Wilson and her party were already seated, the entire audience arose and applauded him for two minutes without cessation.

There were brief speeches by Fire Commissioner Adams and Henry Moscovitz, head of the Civil Service Commission, both of whom represented Mayor Mitchell.

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OFFERS TO CLEAR UP NEPONSIT LAND DEAL

W.A. Moore Wants to Testify Before Grand Jury.

William Austin Moore, a lawyer of 1040 Sterling place, Brooklyn, formerly an Assistant United States District Attorney, said last night that if he could be called before the Grand Jury, which is inquiring into the Rockaway land deal, he would be able to clear up the situation, provided he was allowed to have certain correspondence that passed between himself, the Attorney-General and the Solicitor of the Treasury.

This correspondence, it is understood, was written after the Government had commenced its ejectment suit against the Neponset Realty Company, which legal action was under the direction of Mr. Moore.

Mr. Moore said that, contrary to statements that have been made in various quarters, the Government never did have any title to the land at Rockaway, although the settlement of the ejectment suit gave it a guaranteed title for about sixteen acres for a life saving station.

"I'm willing to be called before the Grand Jury," said Mr. Moore, "but nobody has yet asked me to appear. I think I know something about the situation involving the Rockaway land but the public doesn't. I could clear up the matter beautifully if I were called."

CHICAGO GERMANS ASHAMED OF MAYOR

Workers for Liberalization of Teuton Government Assemble Here.

The Germans of Chicago are not proud of Mayor Thompson. So says Otto C. Butz, Chicago lawyer, one of the delegates from that city to the congress which met in the Park Avenue Hotel yesterday to form a national organization to aid the liberal leaders of Germany who are striving for a freer government than the Kaiser has given them.

The congress was called by the Society of the Friends of the German Republic, a New York organization, of which Julius Koenig is secretary. It is doubtful if that name will be taken over by the coalition. While they agree in detesting the Kaiser, some of them think that the liberal leaders should be left free to work out whatever form of government they want, and not have their American brothers telling them it must be a republic.

Mr. Butz said yesterday at the meeting: "We are loyal to President Wilson and to America. The German 4th of July celebration has been deceived. The government has been pretty good—made good internal laws, and they therefore have trusted us with power. Little by little they are waking up. Take the Argentine matter and the Luxburg note—the German people would find it hard to believe that the destruction of a boat with all on board—no one left to tell the tale."

"As these things are suggested, the consciousness of the Germans their loyalty to the Government must weaken. Of course while they believe they are fighting for their national life they will fight on, but it is the business of the Friends of German Freedom over here to wake our countrymen there to the real facts and give them what aid we can in ridding themselves of autocracy."

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RUSH IS CONFIDENT HE'LL BEAT M'AVOY

Democrats Are Beginning to See Murphy's Selfishness, He Says.

Thomas E. Rush, Surveyor of the Port and veteran Tammany Hall chief, is confident that the Democratic voters are so sick of Murphy leadership that they will give him a clear cut majority over Murphy's candidate for the Supreme Court, John V. McAvoy, when they go to the primaries next Wednesday.

"I am not spouting optimism," said Mr. Rush last night, "when I predict that there will be a very big primary vote, possibly 90,000, and that I shall be nominated over Mr. McAvoy when the returns are in. As I have diagnosed the situation Democrats are beginning to understand the cold selfishness of Charles F. Murphy's boss-ship. They are beginning to see that my fight is not against the sacred principles of organization but actually in behalf of organization. I am offering myself as a means of so thoroughly rebuking Murphy that he will have to step down and out."

Mr. Rush said that he has been enrolled 194,000 Democrats of Manhattan would go to the primaries. Next Wednesday I believe that upward of 50 per cent will cast their ballots. Innumerable letters asking me for advice as to how to vote have come from Democrats who don't ordinarily trouble to vote at the primaries."

Mr. Rush issued his final statement last night, an open letter to the voters. He says at the outset that he believes in the candidacy of Charles F. Murphy, Democratic voters of much greater interest and of vastly more importance than the ambition of any individual for public office. He details his service to the Democratic party and to the Tammany organization, refers to his unhesitating loyalty to Tammany and explains the reasons for his resignation of leadership because it offends his sense of decency.

"My experience in all of these years," says Mr. Rush, "has led me to believe that I have been able to accomplish for the cause of decency in politics in the Twenty-ninth Assembly district, where I have been the leader, has forced me at last to the unwelcome conclusion that I might just as well have been unknown and unnamed, as far as having any real opportunity to transform or substantially better the government they want, and not have their American brothers telling them it must be a republic."

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GOVERNOR ACQUITS SWANN OF CHARGES

Upholds Report of Commissioner Ingraham.

ALBANY, Sept. 15.—Gov. Whitman dismissed today the charges preferred by the City Club against Edward Swann, District Attorney of New York county. By this action the Governor upheld the report of George L. Ingraham, who as special commissioner heard the evidence in the case. The Governor's order of dismissal follows: "An application for the removal of Edward Swann from the office of District Attorney of New York county having been made by the City Club of New York on January 14, 1917, and the said Edward Swann having made answer thereto on February 3, 1917, and thereafter a commissioner having been appointed to hear the charges and report his conclusions thereon, and said commissioner having filed with me his report dated August 29, 1917, together with his findings: 'The public interest would justify my acquittal, in the exercise of your discretion, in the removal of the said Swann from the office of District Attorney of the county of New York' and after a public hearing on September 12, after hearing arguments in behalf of the said Swann and in his removal and also on behalf of the said Swann, and after carefully weighing all of the facts and circumstances, and after careful consideration of all the charges, the evidence submitted thereon and the report of the commissioner, it is hereby ordered that the charges against Edward Swann be, and the same hereby are dismissed."

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
