

BULGARIA REBELS IN WAR WEARINESS

Country Is Beginning to See That Germany Cannot Win.

ALLIANCE NOT POPULAR

Notorious Corruption in Radoslavoff Government Causes Exasperation.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The Times today prints an article on Bulgaria's war weariness and the anti-german reaction which the writer says the Radoslavoff government is extremely unpopular among the people.

Bulgaria, it is argued, is beginning to see that Germany cannot win, therefore that Bulgaria cannot keep Macedonia and Dobruja. The writer continues: "To the profound dissatisfaction with the Radoslavoff policy, the new is added exasperation at the notorious corruption. Many persons in Bulgaria believe the Premier and Finance Minister Douchetoff have mismanaged the war."

SIGHT ON MICHAELIS.

Moderates and Radicals Displeased by Chancellor's Policy.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 15.—At a Socialist meeting in Berlin yesterday Philipp Scheidemann, leader of the Socialist majority in the Reichstag, deplored the fact that Germany's enemies had scoffed at the German desire for peace.

"We will not renounce a square foot of German soil," he declared.

Dr. Michaelis, Herr Scheidemann declared, was unsuited to the post of Chancellor.

At the opening of the Socialist conference in Wurzburg, Bavaria, a monster demonstration in favor of peace by understanding in regard to have taken place.

Philip Scheidemann told the audience that all conditions of life warranted the Socialists in their present attitude toward the war.

In Austria and Hungary some Socialist newspapers are making a strong attempt to start an anti-peace propaganda, the Kripp and other similar interests said in a statement.

TYPHOID VANQUISHED BY NAVY SURGEONS

Mumps and Measles Chief Trouble Now.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Typhoid fever and other communicable diseases practically have been vanquished from the navy by modern preventive methods.

Surgeon-General Husted reported today to Secretary Daniels, despite the enormous increase in the navy personnel, fewer than ten cases of typhoid have been reported since the war began.

"The health of the navy is excellent," the report said, "and the training of men is not to be interfered with at any of the training stations by the presence of communicable diseases."

Practically the only diseases which have been much concerned during the present war have been those of the respiratory type, which are spread mainly by nose and throat secretions.

Principally mumps and measles, which are associated with a low mortality rate or no mortality rate at all.

This is in marked contrast to the experience of 1918, during the Spanish-American war, when the communicable intestinal diseases caused widespread damage and carried with them a high mortality rate.

Modern medical science has practically eliminated such diseases from the forces afloat and ashore.
