MEN IN TRENCHES.

American Troops Getting Insight of Realities of War. By the Associated Press. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct. 27.—The nearest enemy trench is within a few hundred yards away.

Marched in Driving Rain.

Standing in a little almost deserted shell-wrecked village, well within hostile range and a few kilometers from the trenches, the Associated Press correspondent watched the troops marching up a driving rain over roads covered with sticky mud.

Troops Whistle With Joy.

The American soldiers on the street apparently as proud as though on dress parade, notwithstanding that they had marched miles from the billets where they had been since coming by motor trucks and railway from the instruction center.

German Shells Hit Nothing.

No "strat" developed although the Germans put a few shells into the air, but they were all high and did not hit anything.

PETROGRAD TO BE HELD

Kerensky Denies Plan to Surrender Capital—Foe to Drive on Finland.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 27.—Russian positions on the coast of the Gulf of Riga were bombarded yesterday by German warships, but there was no material change in the situation there.

Peasants Oppose Congress.

The Council of Peasants' Deputies adopted a resolution with only three dissenting votes, disapproving of the proposed transfer of the Russian territory to the enemy as alleged by some newspapers.

Stamp in Shipments.

M. Andersberg, manager of the exploitation department of the Ministry of Ways and Communications, in an interview regarding the critical state of the Russian railways, declared that the total shipments during July, August and September was less than during last January and February.

FLIERS FIRE ON GERMANS

Close to Houseboats and Empty Machine Guns. LONDON, Oct. 27.—The official statement on aviation activities to-night says: "On Friday our airplanes, flying at a low altitude, fired 10,000 rounds from their machine guns on hostile troops that were endeavoring to reach the entanglements on the enemy's horse and mechanical transports on the roads and in shell holes."

Millions of Fish Stored.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Storage holdings of frozen and cured fish on October 25 amounted to 61,834,763 pounds, the Department of Agriculture to-day announced. That was an increase of about 19.1 per cent. over a year ago.

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ATTACK A SURPRISE.

Mackensen Fell Upon Cadorna's Army With Shocking Suddenness. By the Associated Press. ITALY, Oct. 27.—Practically the entire Austrian army, reinforced by heavy German contingents conducted by the redoubtable Field Marshal von Mackensen, is now facing the Italian army in the greatest offensive since the beginning of the war, with the evident purpose of invading the Friul region, the easternmost province of Venezia.

GOAL PRICE RAISED BY WILSON'S ORDER

Increase of 45 Cents a Ton on Bituminous Throughout the Country.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—President Wilson signed an administrative order to-night authorizing a flat advance in the price of bituminous coal at the mines of 45 cents a ton.

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U. S. TO LIMIT PROFIT OF FOOD PURVEYORS

Price to Be Based, Not on Market Demand, but on Producers' Costs. Wholesalers to Be Permitted to Charge Only a Fixed Advance on Purchases. WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Restriction of the profits of the wholesaler to normal compensatory advances over the prices he pays to the producer on foodstuffs, particularly foodstuffs of a non-perishable character, instead of price gouging by the public market will be the policy of the United States Food Administration and this principle will be set forth in special regulations governing a large number of non-perishable articles.

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BUTTER BOARD MAY CLOSE.

Elgin Institution Threatened by Food Administration. CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The Elgin Butter Board, which sets the basic price for butter for most of the country, may be closed at the request of the Government. It was said that the board's investigation of the circumstances surrounding the advance and will deal individually "by administrative orders" with dealers charging excessive prices.

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
