AUGUSTUS THOMAS WALLOPS HILLQUIT

Hopes Wilson Will Do With Socialist What Lincoln Did With Vallandigham.

SEND HIM TO ENEMY

Copperheadism Is Denounced at Meeting of Allied Theatrical Arts.

Augustus Thomas, the playwright and a Democrat, leaned far over the footlights in the Criterion Theatre last night as he told an audience of 2,000 that he hoped that Wilson in his wisdom would do with Morris Hillquit what Abraham Lincoln did with Vallandigham, the Copperhead—make a present of him to the enemy.

Throughout the meeting, which was called by the Allied Theatrical Arts to voice their admiration of Mayor Mitchell, Mr. Thomas had listened to such denunciations of Hillquit as have seldom been hurled at a man calling himself an American citizen.

Nation's Eyes on New York.

"I have been out in the country—in Minnesota, Missouri, Illinois and also where—selling Liberty bonds," said Mr. Thomas, his voice shaking with emotion, "and wherever I went, the people asked me, 'What are you doing?' 'I am selling Liberty bonds,' I would tell them. 'I tell you that the whole nation is watching us. Every capital in Europe is waiting in Europe to wait anxiously for our election day.'

Mayor Unable to Attend.

The theatre rocked with the cheering, and it was several minutes before Mr. Thomas could make the announcement that Theodore Rousseau, secretary of the Mayor, was present to say that the Mayor's throat was in poor condition and that his physician had ordered him to take a brief rest until to-day from the rigorous strain of campaigning.
