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PIANISTE ESCAPES EXECUTION AS SPY

Mme. Carreno-Blois Tells of Being Saved by Letter From Gerard.

Mme. Teresa Carreno-Blois, pianiste native of this State and daughter of Mme. Teresa Carreno, who achieved international fame as a pianist and died in this city last June, arrived yesterday at an American port and told how she had been saved from a firing squad at Bona, Algeria, through the good offices of Ambassador Gerard at Berlin.

Mme. Carreno-Blois admitted that she did not like the French and that she had been many years a resident of Berlin, where the body of her mother, who was born in Venezuela, is to be taken after the war; but she asserted that she never had done any spy work for Germany.

She said she sailed from America late in 1914 for Morocco. The steamship put into Bona to discharge freight and while she was there a German gunboat began bombarding the port and there was an uprising of Arabs near the city.

The French marines subdued the Arabs. The next morning the marines loaded the steamship and arrested her, accusing her of being a German spy.

Mme. Carreno-Blois said her trial was halted and she was sent back to prison. She was accused of making false declarations about herself and the trial was resumed, resulting in her conviction.

She was prepared to die when she was informed that Ambassador Gerard had obtained her birth certificate and she was released and deported to Spain.


