

ROCKEFELLER ASKS AID IN FIGHT ON VICE

Pages Cooperation in Developing War Camp Community Recreation Service.

INVITES HOME EXAMPLE

Says Clean Living Will Shorten War and Keep Our Fighters Fit.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., whose work toward the suppression of vice has had important results in the last few years, addressed a conference of newspaper publishers and editors in his office at 26 Broadway yesterday afternoon on the general topic of forwarding the program of the War Camp Community Recreation Service.

FOR HIGHER MORALITY STANDARD.

Mr. Rockefeller laid stress upon the constructive rather than the repressive nature of the work of the War Camp Community Recreation Service and the tremendously beneficial results not only to soldiers but to all of the people of the United States that are certain to accrue if the young men now in training for war or who go abroad to fight are properly safeguarded from vice and consequent disease.

FIRST NATION TO ORGANIZE.

Mr. Rockefeller called attention to the fact that the United States is the first nation in the history of the world to organize morally against an enemy. Through the Food Administration, which is supported by the Army and Navy departments, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the War Camp Community Recreation Service and playground associations in 125 communities, the Government is moving to furnish young men in training with so much recreation that they will have no time or inclination to seek vice.
