Cornelius Bliss, Jr. Acknowledges Check for \$55,000 Sent by Barnes.

The American Red Cross is the richer by \$55,000 as the result of a check received yesterday from the Metropolitan Golf Association.

On Wednesday of this week Barnes sent the following letter to Elliot Wadsworth, acting chairman of the American Red Cross:

"As treasurer of the Metropolitan Golf Association of New York, I take pleasure in sending herewith a check for \$55,000 made payable to the order of the American Red Cross.

"The following is a copy of a telegram dated December 11, 1917, received by the writer from Elliot Wadsworth, acting chairman of the American Red Cross:

"American Red Cross will be glad to receive money collected and will if possible use same for the purchase of ambulances and other necessities for which ever foreign country most need it.

Bliss Accepts Check.

The following reply was received yesterday from Cornelius Bliss, Jr., who is on the Red Cross war council committee appointed by President Wilson:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 12th inst. with a check enclosed for \$55,000, representing the very generous contributions from the members of clubs enrolled in the Metropolitan Golf Association at tournaments given on May 30, 1917.
