

CECIL SPRING RICE DEAD IN OTTAWA

Former Ambassador Succumbs in Sleep to Attack of Heart Disease.

HIS FUNERAL SATURDAY

Ex-Envoy Worn Down by War Burden—Was Roosevelt's Best Man.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Sir Cecil Spring Rice, until recently British Ambassador to the United States, died of heart disease in Government House at 1 o'clock this morning.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Diplomatic Washington was shocked today by the news of the sudden death of Sir Cecil Spring Rice.

Although it had been known that Sir Cecil had desired for a long time before to retire from his post, it was a great relief to the members of the embassy no intimation was given when he left Washington that he was in ill health.

It was known that Sir Cecil tendered his resignation during the visit here to the British ambassador, Lord Northcliffe, at the convenience of the Foreign Office.

His retirement was announced from London on January 2, in connection with a brief illness on Thursday, February 14, 1918, Emma B., widow of George A. Moulton, formerly of Annapolis, L. I., and later of Mapleswood, N. J., in her seventy-fourth year.
