

WOULD FORCE PEACE BY 5 YEAR BOYCOTT

Senator Owen Proposes a League to Punish Germany After the War.

BAN ON ALL PRODUCTS

Suggests Additional Year's Penalty for Each Month's Delay in Signing Terms.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The Central Powers to an immediate peace through the threat of a five year period of complete commercial and economic isolation was the project urged on the Senate today by Senator Owen (Okla.), Democrat. This was the threat which Senator Owen suggested should be held against the Teutonic alliance as a penalty for a more thoughtful consideration of the post-war troubles which must be met by the defeated group of nations in the present war.

Mr. Owen did not explain to the Senate just how the German peoples and their allies would be punished if the war was certain to be won ultimately by the Entente alliance, and thereby hung a suggestion of possible difficulties in the negotiation of the peace which in effect was embodied in these proposals: "The Administration should at once set about negotiation of a treaty with our enemies... FACTORIES MAKE UP FOR FUELLESS DAYS
