\$60,000,000 HOUSING BILL PASSES HOUSE

Carries \$10,000,000 to Shelter Clerks in Washington.

Special Despatch to THE SUN. WASHINGTON, April 2.—The House passed to-day the housing bill sponsored by the Department of Labor, which makes available \$60,000,000 to be expended in construction of houses for workers in industrial plants engaged on war work.

When the Secretary deems it advisable, Government money may be loaned to private contractors for construction of homes to be rented to industrial workers engaged on war work.

Members of the House committee reporting the bill said a recent investigation of housing conditions by the Council of National Defense had disclosed an "alarming condition."

INSTALLMENT TAXES IN M'CORMICK BILL

Would Relieve Country of Financial Strain.

It is estimated that the income and excess profits taxes will bring from \$2,500,000,000 to \$4,000,000,000. Under the present law these taxes must be paid before July 1 next.
