More Than Score Protest to Health Board Regarding Jersey Plants.

ODOR WAFTED FAR OVER

Conditions Become Worse as Weather Improves, Say Several Victims.

Testimony from more than a score of residents of the upper West Side and 400 written complaints were received by the State Board of Health yesterday in regard to the acid fumes and noxious odors from commercial plants on the Jersey shore, which, it is asserted, for years have constituted a nuisance.

TAMMANY SALARY GRAFT SEEN IN-LAW

Bronx Taxpayers to Ask for Abolishment of Commissioner of Records.

Special Dispatch to THE SUN. ALBANY, April 20.—Gov. Whitman today signed the bill of Senator Walters making it mandatory upon the New York city Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate the money to pay the employees needed in the office of Commissioner John J. Knewitz of the Bronx.

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Prosecutor Charges False Warehouse Receipts Were Sent to Banks.

When Tonko L. Milic, a rich Austrian, was lodged in the Tombs in February by Federal officers, charged with grand larceny, the Madero Brothers, Inc., of 100 John street, with which Milic was associated, had obtained \$218,000 from various New York banks on fraudulent warehouse receipts, Ferdinand Pecora, Assistant District Attorney, said yesterday. He had received the information, he said, in his investigation after the arrest Friday of Ernesto Madero, president of the concern. He is charged with larceny of \$102,000 from the National Bank of Commerce.

He was taken to-night to Camp Grant, Illinois, where he will be tried by court-martial on a charge of desertion.

TAFT ASKS DRAFT ARMY OF 5,000,000

Tells Boston War Will Be Three Year Task.

Boston, April 20.—"I am in favor of amending the draft law so that we can raise an army of five or six million men in two years," said former President Taft in addresses at two Liberty Loan rallies to-day.
