

GREAT RED CROSS DRIVE SHAPING UP

Borough Divisions of City to Be Followed Generally in Campaign.

CHURCH BELLS TO PEAL First Gun Will Be Fired at Meeting Monday Night in Waldorf-Astoria.

Organization for the countrywide drive for the second war fund of \$100,000,000 for the American Red Cross completed yesterday and the personnel of the officials in charge and the working teams were announced from headquarters in the Woolworth Building.

New York city's allotment of the total to be raised is \$25,000,000, and the organization that has been elected is perhaps the most complete organization that the city has known.

The organization plan will follow generally the borough divisions of the Greater City, with the addition of the Van Cortlandt section of The Bronx as a separate division.

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The progress of the campaign will be announced to New Yorkers every afternoon next week at 3 o'clock by the ringing of church bells throughout the city.

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cialist revolution either in our system of government or in the private ownership of industry." Mr. Easley said: "It is undoubtedly true that things will be different after the war, and not only different but, let us hope, very much better. Under the stress of doing things to save our country we have discovered many weak spots and many dark spots which our war experience will enable us to strengthen in the one case and to eradicate in the other. Those who labor with their hands are going to be assured of more just wages and fairer hours, as well as of more humane working and living conditions.

Not Going to Happen. "But many other things which are now being talked about are not going to happen. In the first place, we are not going into State Socialism; we are not going over to Government ownership and operation of factories, mines, mills and all means of production and distribution, and of the land."

Old Hardships Done With. Mr. Easley holds that the railroads and all transportation facilities will be improved at the close of the war because the Government never will restore the handicaps of restrictive legislation.

Red Cross Workers to Take Oath. 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Cities Election Here. "In the New York Mayorality campaign last year Morris Hillquit polled 150,000 votes and Victor Berger in his recent contest for United States Senator in Wisconsin polled 110,000 votes. But this vote, says Mr. Easley, is explained by the addition to the Socialist of the pro-Germans and anti-English Irish, pacifists and other disloyal forces. A referendum taken within the last year showed that the dues paying membership of the Socialist party, which alone is entitled to a vote in its affairs, had fallen to less than 22,000.
