\$40,000,000 JUMP IN POSTAL PAY VOTED

Senate Adopts Amendment to Boost Salaries.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—An amendment to the post office appropriation bill providing for an increase of \$200 a year in the salaries of clerks, letter carriers and certain other postal employees and increases of 20 per cent for rural mail carriers and for employees receiving less than \$800 a year was adopted today by the Senate.

NEW PERSHING SHOE MADE "INSIDE OUT"

Hobnailed and Riveted and Has Four Soles.

ATLANTIC CITY, May 15.—The building of shoes for Uncle Sam's fighting forces now takes practically all the sole leather that can be produced, according to leading men of the leather industry in annual session here at the Traymore at the convention of the Tanners Council.

The Pershing shoe will not have the soft toe now familiar in the army shoes, but the heel will be the same. The new shoe will be higher by two inches than the present type, its uppers riveted and soles hobnailed instead of sewed. It will cost twice as much as the type now in use.

LIBERTY BONDS AID SALVATION ARMY

Contribution of \$5,000 Starts Third Day of the Campaign.

TOTAL NOW IS \$150,000

Mrs. Russell Sage Gives \$2,500 and Seven \$1,000 Checks Are Sent In.

The fact that the monarchy has an outlook and interests entirely different from Germany's, besides most complicated national problems to solve.

For a country deeply in debt as Austria-Hungary, which will have to pay Germany alone more than 700,000,000 crowns annual interest, a new billion loan could be raised only in the United States.

The latter country, however, can on no battlefield be compelled to entertain such a loan. The United States refuse the money, then the transformation of Austria's war industries to peace conditions would be an impossible task.

"It is not natural that Austria-Hungary should seek a peace which would leave it in a position of utter dependence on any other State, needs America's friendship."

Yorwerker, the German Socialist organ, says that the Emperor's attitude is a political intelligence of Austria, while at the same time it is the heart's desire of Germans in Austria.

The Berlin Lok-Anzeiger says: "The meeting of the two Emperors was a world political event of great importance, which, in view of the tremendous military strain in the west, is particularly calculated to enable us to look forward to a more rapid progress to further successes for the German sword."

"The renewal of the alliance," says the New York Herald, "realizes the political intelligence of Austria, while at the same time it is the heart's desire of Germans in Austria."

The New York Herald says that as a result of the Emperor's visit to Vienna, the "four painful years" of the alliance probably will be made general "as desired by old Emperor William."

The Emperor's visit to Emperor Charles of Austria, who referred to the Emperor's conference as harmonious, Emperor William telegraphed to the ruler of the dual monarchy as follows:

"I am exceedingly glad you are so satisfied with your visit here. It is a great joy to me also to have seen you and to have established relations of our detailed discussions our entire accord regarding the aims which guide us. "I hope soon to be in a position to take advantage of your kind invitation. Heartly greetings to Zita and yourself. In true friendship."

The telegram sent by Emperor Charles to Emperor William read:

"At the moment of my heart and in the ground of the German empire on my way home I feel impelled again to greet you warmly and to express my heartfelt thanks for your very kind and friendly realization will bring great blessing and good wishes of fourteen bakers."

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DETROIT PASTOR IN MODERATOR RACE

Dr. Vance Looms as Dark Horse at Presbyterian Assembly.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 15.—Election of a new moderator at the opening here of a ten days' session of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, North, assumed to-day the nature of a three cornered contest, when Dr. J. H. Vance of Detroit announced his candidacy.

Virtually all of the candidates opened headquarters to-day. Dr. J. Frank Smith of Dallas, Tex., and Dr. W. C. Covert of Chicago were the most prominently mentioned for the place. Dr. Vance entered as a "dark horse."

The new moderator will be elected tomorrow afternoon. At the opening session in the morning the 1,000 commissioners will hold a communion service and will listen to a sermon by Dr. J. Wilbur Chapman, the retiring moderator.

An organic union of all evangelical churches of the country under the name "The Church of America" promises to be one of the most important overtures presented to the assembly.

The allied forces fighting in the trenches of Europe for a common cause, the breaking down of national walls and sectarian walls among millions facing death and giving "promise of a new world more unified and brotherly and increasingly impatient of artificial barriers," all call for organic church union, the overture asserts.

The overture proposes a "general polity" in which local churches shall drop their denominational names and take the general name of "The Church of America," with such local prefixes as they see fit.

Under the plan to be suggested each church would adopt its own form of worship and the government by a majority vote of its members, and each church would choose its own minister by its own method.

No obstacle is in sight to prevent a vote in favor of a reunion of the northern and southern branches of the Presbyterian Church.

AUSTRIANS DEPLORE CZERNIN'S FAILURE

People Regard Minister as Their Herald of Peace.

AMSTERDAM, May 15.—The Tjid prints the following significant and much censured letter from its Vienna correspondents.

The reason why all classes of the population have regretted Count Czernin's departure from the Foreign Office is that in him they saw the herald of peace.

It is not surprising, because the military is extreme. (This part censored.)

The people will probably hold out through the next difficult months until the Ukraine grain arrives in sufficient quantities. But it is natural that every day they are more impatient.

Only the conviction that the Emperor honestly desires peace and has given evidence of this in recent incidents keeps the people going.

IRISH CROPS TO INCREASE.
