MESSAGE TO ITALY SENT BY WILSON

Cablegram Extending Warm Fraternal Greetings Read by Lansing at Meeting.

BIDS THEM GODSPEED

"We Will Win This War," Says Secretary of State at Washington Celebration.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The third anniversary of Italy's entrance into the war was celebrated in Washington to-night at a mass meeting under the patronage of President Wilson, at which Secretary Lansing and Count Macchi di Celere, the Italian Ambassador, were speakers.

Many high Government officials, foreign diplomats and members of Congress attended.

A message from President Wilson extending fraternal greetings to the Italian people and bidding them godspeed was read by Secretary Lansing. It has been called to Ambassador Paga at Rome and will be read throughout Italy to-morrow at celebrations commemorating the day three years ago when Italy again unfurled her battle flag against the Central Powers.

Wilson's Message.

The message said:

I am sure I am speaking for the people of the United States in sending you these warm fraternal greetings upon this, the anniversary of the entrance of Italy into this great war in which there is being fought out the most irrepressible conflict between free government and the dictation of force.

The people of the United States have looked with profound interest and sympathy upon the efforts and sacrifices of the Italian people and are deeply and sincerely interested in the present and future security of Italy.

It is the policy of the United States to be associated with a people to whom they are bound by so many personal and intimate ties in a struggle whose object is the freedom, freedom, the rights of men and nations to live their own lives and determine their own fortunes, the rights of the weak as well as the strong and the maintenance of justice by the treatable force of free nations leagued together in the defense of mankind. With ever increasing resolution and force we shall continue to stand together in this sacred common cause.

America salutes the gallant kingdom of Italy and bids her godspeed. We are confident that the efforts and sacrifices of the Italian people and the aid of the United States will bring about the final triumph of the cause of liberty and justice for all peoples.

Count di Celere said he was deeply touched by the message and the president of Italy's day was held under the patronage of the President of the United States.

Other Boroughs to Celebrate.

The celebration in Manhattan will be supplemented by ceremonies in other boroughs during the entire day of the Four Minute Men, the National League for Women's Service and a dozen other organizations. School children will be taught about the war by the distribution of flowers in the morning for distribution and fifty flower girls will stand at traffic centers during most of the day, dispensing bouquets.

A flying corps will visit West Street to turn finance to an observance of the day.

The parade, of 150 automobiles, led by Capt. Adelaide Bayling of the National League for Women's Service, will proceed from Sixty-first street south on Fifth avenue to Washington Square, starting at 11 A. M. Women in costume will show the bouquettiers to the sidewalk, where the cars move slowly along. A band will lead the line with a police escort. At Washington Square the parade will break and flowers will be distributed through six sections of the borough.

In Washington Square from 7:30 P. M. to 11 o'clock an open air concert will be given by the Italian societies. Near the statue of Garibaldi Theodore Roosevelt, President Nicholas Murray Butler and others will speak. Including Prof. Cecate Ferrara, late President of the Italian Chamber of Deputies, and Count Tritton and Gen. Guglielmo of the Italian Washington Embassy and Capt. S. Gallucci, ex-Governor of Benndi. Clarence Whitehill of the Metropolitan and Rosa White of the Chicago Opera Company will sing.
