FOOD BOARD BARS MIDNIGHT SNACKS

Eight o'clock Store Closing Planned to End Lunch Before Retiring.

With this object in view the Federal Food Board has approved a movement among the guests who are invited to the closing of every store handling foodstuffs at 8 o'clock every night with the exception of Saturday.

Believing that it will result in better conditions in the retail trade, an increase in efficiency in service to the public and saving in many directions, the Federal Food Board indorses the movement for early closing of retail stores.
