### Invaders Have Lost 50 Per Cent. of 80 Divisions in Aisne Battle.

FORCES STILL STRONG

Foeh's Great Manoeuvre Army Undrawn Upon and Ready for New Attack.

MAY BE ABOVE SOMME

Critics Believe Enemy Will Hit Again Before American Army Grows Larger.

LONDON, June 14.—Comparative quiet seems to have settled down upon the whole battle front in France and Belgium, where there has been no fighting of more than the "local engagement" kind.

Either the Germans are tired of losing men at the terrific rate of the last few days and are taking a rest, or else they are busy concocting a new drive on some other part of the front, probably to the north. The German report to-day describes a "violent attack" southwest of Ypres by the French between Voormezele and Vierstraet, in the Kemmel sector, which is said to have failed, with the capture of 150 French prisoners.

Field Marshal Haig to-night apparently referring to the same affair, says the French patrols brought in a few prisoners during the night north of Bailleul.

The early French report mentions only minor raids, one near Grivesnes, which is close to Cantigny, and one southeast near Courcelles, where the brilliant counter attack of the French last Tuesday broke the back of the German advance toward Compiègne. The constant drive for Paris seems to have divided to the most ineffective and the most feeble of all the German offensives.

Their heaviest attacks were stopped in three or four days so effectively that now they seem to be dead.

Speculation as to New Move.

No quiet has the front become and so flimsy the German "push" that the French experts are becoming suspicious and many of them are returning to the theory they held before the Marne drive was checked that the main effort of the Germans has not yet been made. It is certain that many hundreds of thousands of German troops are being held in reserve in this area and were not employed in any of the fighting since May 27, when this offensive began.

The prevailing opinion is that the real drive will be for the Channel ports, rather than for Paris, and that the theatre will be before Amiens, or, more likely, before Arras. It was in these sections that the German artillery was most active last night and today, a revived activity that usually is the forerunner of an infantry attack in force.

The Associated Press correspondents with the French army in France says it appears scarcely possible that the Germans will recommence serious work for the present on the line of Montdidier-Noyon. Their offensive for the capture of Compiègne, with the possibility of making further progress toward Paris from the base that they hoped to attain there, may be regarded as having met a bloody check, costing them thousands of men belonging to their best divisions.

Sought to Head Americans.

There appears no doubt that the Germans desired to make an imposing advance toward the capital and at the same time inflict losses on the French and the British before the latter were ready to take the field. They assuredly are anxious in regard to the rapidly growing forces from across the Atlantic Ocean and are trying their utmost to use up the old armies in front of them before fresh transatlantic troops arrive in sufficiently strong force to turn the balance.

The heroism of the veteran troops, who in these last days have inflicted such terrific losses on the flower of the German army, has given the foe a rude shock. The Germans probably will try to break through somewhere else, but the Allies, with their armies under the command of Gen. Foch, are confident that they will check the Germans anywhere.

The military commentators in Paris are unanimous in reporting the German drive a failure. The enemy has won a strip of territory not without value but has sacrificed for it precious divisions without at any point attaching his objective and without bringing him any nearer a decisive result. Such is also the opinion of Henri Hideo and Col. de Thomassin, who would be the last person to halt a victory prematurely.

Allied Reserve in Contact.

In its summary of the expert opinion in Paris the Havas Agency notes the unanimity with which the commentators have abandoned their reserve of the past few days and agree with M. Barres of the Echo de Paris in his opinion that the offensive against Paris is ended, for the present at least.

They add that the possibility of the offensive being renewed had already been ruled out by the fact that the heavy fighting which it is resumed within a few days will be on another front.

The results of the offensive against Paris are enumerated by Barres thus: A terrific gain absolutely out of proportion to the losses sustained; Compiègne still in French possession;
