

Paris, June 16.—Decisions of the high importance which the Allies must make soon have brought up the question of the participation of the United States in the councils where these decisions are to be made.

Publicists of the Entente are making why America is not in the councils of the Allies. While the services of Gen. Bliss in the Versailles conference are valuable in a military sense, they lack a certain political character which can be expected only from a civilian representative.

Attention is drawn to the paradox of an Allies Council shaping policies based upon President Wilson's ideas and according to American formulas, while America herself is holding aloof, the spokesman of the Allies believes that a stage has now been reached where the concerted policy of the Allies is passing into the last process of evolution.

Time for Statecraft. Apart from giving all attention to military efforts, the belief is prevalent that the time is ripe for the Allies to create an unswerving political unity in order to arm them for the peace conference.
