

FONCK SCORES HIS 49TH AIR VICTORY

Noted French Flier Brings Down Five Enemy Machines in Two Days.

SLADE IS NEWEST ACE

Has Ten Planes to His Credit—German Aviation Grounds Bombed.

PARIS, June 30.—Lieut. Rene Fonck is now credited officially with having brought down forty-nine German machines. Lieut. Slade, the newest French ace, has reached a total of ten German machines, his latest being credited to him yesterday.

WANTED ANOTHER CRACK AT ENEMY Marine From Bronx, Severely Wounded, Previously Tasted Fire. Robert Slater, named among the severely wounded in yesterday's casualty list of marines, is one of eleven children of Morris Slater, who owns a small grocery store at 666 East 154th street, The Bronx. He is 24 years old. He enlisted in the marines in Chicago early in 1917 and has been in France about six months. Two weeks ago he wrote his father he had been wounded slightly but "was feeling fine" and hoped to "get another crack at the Hun" in a few days. Young brother George is with the National Army at Spartanburg, S. C.

Y. M. C. A. OPENS CLUB IN PARIS For French Women Employed in War Department Offices. PARIS, June 30.—The Y. M. C. A. has opened clubrooms to-day for French women and girls employed in the offices of the War Department. The new club consists of seven rooms and a kitchen. It is near the War Ministry and is under the direction of Miss Gertrude Griffith of New York. The club will offer courses in English, bookkeeping, shorthand and recreational work. The Y. M. C. AUSTRIAN LOSSES LISTED AT 110,000 Premier of Hungary Creates Furor by His Announcement in Parliament. EXPLAINS THE RETREAT Says Army Was Withdrawn in Order to Save Lives, as Peril Was Great.

AMSTERDAM, June 30.—Gradually the extent of the Austrian losses in the recent offensive and defeat on the Italian front is beginning to reach the people, who are demanding to know the facts. In the Hungarian Parliament on Saturday, Dr. Alexander Wekerle, the Hungarian Premier, caused a sensation by stating the losses, according to a despatch from Budapest received here to-day. The Premier admitted that the loss was 100,000, not counting captives, which he put at 10,000.

"The number of prisoners taken was recently stated to be 18,000," the Premier replied. "I must, however, correct that statement. The truth is that the Italians have taken 12,000, while 50,000 Austrians fell into their hands. In the case of an offensive, it must be certain that we cannot be termed excessively high. High casualties in the loss we suffered in dead, wounded and sick, mostly sick. In the tenth and eleventh Italian offensives, we lost 80,000 to 100,000 men. Now, however, our losses are similar, about 100,000 men."

Great excitement in the Chamber marked this declaration. The Premier continued: "I am obliged to record this regrettable circumstance. This figure includes the fallen, the slightly wounded and those brought back as ineffective." "A great uproar interrupted the Premier at these words, as they were all Hungarian. When quiet was restored Premier Wekerle continued: "I mention these figures to describe the situation with perfect sincerity. Also because our enemies will certainly not betray these losses in an exaggerated fashion and perhaps also our public opinion. There are also rumors circulating that on the 11th of June, 1918, Hungarian troops were called upon in excessively large numbers and that the losses fell upon them only. Therefore I must point out that thirty-three Hungarian and thirty-seven Austrian regiments participated in the entire offensive and retreat, or 47 per centage Hungarian and 53 Austrian."
