

ALLIES EAGER FOR GERMAN TO STRIKE

Returning Officers Say Many Believe Blow Will Fall on Americans.

ARE READY FOR ENEMY

Trench Raiding Has Taught Caution and Prepared for Business of Fighting.

Several army officers who have been serving with the American Expeditionary Forces in France returned to the United States yesterday after an uneventful voyage. They are on their way to National Army training camps, where they will help to whip the new draft army into shape for service overseas.

One of these officers, who was well known in National Guard circles in New York State before that organization was inducted into the Federal Government service, said that every one in France is waiting eagerly for the next German offensive. He said that the German concentration on the American front, this desire for the German movement is due to the belief that it will be the beginning of the real beginning of the end of the war.

"The American army in France," said the Colonel, whose name for military reasons will not be given, "is the greatest body of men anywhere in the world. It seems that the French people have more confidence in them than they have in their own police. A crowd of peasants will surround almost every American soldier and shower him with tidbits and questions, and France is reeling from end to end with the daredevil stunts of our marines.

"Soldiers Are More Cautious." When the American doughboy first went into the first line trenches he was willing to take every chance, but he is a different proposition today. The chances he took were chiefly in his kindness and trust of German prisoners.

"In spite of the repeated warnings of our commanders who have learned their lesson through experience, our boys would throw away their rifle and hitting his hands cry 'Kamerad.' It was not long before the Americans learned that many of these prisoners would turn upon their captors at unexpected times and stab or shoot them with weapons which had been concealed under blouses or in boots.

"But that order of things has now passed, and throughout France the American fighting man is known as 'The Cleaner' as the result of his thoroughness in mopping up the German trenches after a successful foray.

"The Colonel explained that most of the American raiding parties did their work at night or just before daybreak, and that when the men have had their faces blackened and their eyes have been kept almost immediately lost in the surrounding darkness.

"How Trenches Are Raided." "The silence," he said, "after their departing is nerve racking. All that can be done is to sit tight and wait developments. Suddenly it will begin. The German raiding party will appear, and the enemy outfits will spot the raiding party. But as the star shells light up the American boys give vent to a shout of surprise and rush the enemy trench firing their automatics and hurling grenades as fast as they can. The noise is terrific, but it lasts but a short time and in a short time the boys are back in their own trenches bringing in with them a few prisoners.

"These prisoners are always thoroughly scared and in many cases they are unable to talk for some hours after they are brought in. This is a nightly happening and it is raising the nerves of Fritz.

"Scouts of our doughboys are now fighting side by side with the Australians who taught them the value of the war whoop in this kind of fighting. The boys believe that this war whoop yielded by the American soldiers will win the war and drive the German out of France."

TWO LOSE SUGAR LICENSES. Massachusetts Firms Are Accused of Irregularities.

Berlin, July 6.—The licenses of the E. S. Sherburne Company of this city, said to be one of the largest wholesale distributors of sugar in New England, and of the L. M. Koritz Company, wholesale distributors to Lawrence and northern Massachusetts, were revoked today for the duration of the war by the United States Food Administration for alleged irregularities. Both companies are associated with the P. M. Leavitt Company of this city.

The order affects the Sherburne and Koritz companies as wholesalers and shippers of sugar and other products and permits retailers to sell the Leavitt Company and its other branches only limited amounts of sugar as may be authorized by the State Food Administration.

Stories Part of German Effort to Estrange U. S. From Japan.

ISHII BARES INTRIGUE

Oriental Nation Will Stand by Allies Until End, Ambassador Says.

Boston, July 6.—Viscount Ishii, Japanese Ambassador, speaking today at a luncheon given by Mayor Andrew J. Peters, declared that the German Emperor was responsible for the "yellow peril" in the United States and for an extensive anti-American propaganda campaign in Japan. Two years ago at Tokio, he said, he told the American Ambassador that he thought outside influences were at work to create unfriendly feeling between Japan and America, but that he was not then in a position to state definitely the name of the person he suspected as the instigator.

The Ambassador reiterated that Japan would fight with the Allies until international justice and democracy had been established.

"I remember well about two years ago," he said, "I talked at the foreign office in Tokio with your Ambassador. I asked his excellency if he did not think

as I certainly did, that some outside influence had much to do with the inexplicable misunderstandings constantly occurring between Japan and America. America being then neutral, of course, could not mention Germany by name. The Zimmerman incident which occurred a few months after that conversation completely justified my views. Nor had I spoken without proof.

"Proof of Intrigue." "We had positive proof that the German Kaiser besides being the inventor of the so-called 'yellow peril' had been buying himself to estrange Japan from America.

"Now, gentlemen, I beg you to glance at the text of the Anglo-Japanese alliance treaty. The stipulations, so far as they go, contain no direct bearing on an event taking place in Europe. Japan, had she so elected, might have broken faith with England.

"With her meagre natural resources and the poor state of her finances and American trade, which necessarily was there for Japan to embark on a perilous war against a formidable foe?

"Japan, however, took the matter in a more conscientious way. In the opinion of her statesmen the dominant purpose of the alliance was the peace of the Far East, and the peace of the Far East in their opinion could not be maintained the moment war broke out between Great Britain and Germany, the two great colonial powers in Asia.

"Whatever, then, may have been the wording of the treaty, the spirit of the alliance was clear beyond doubt, and my Government had no hesitation in making the supreme decision.
