THE RED BATTLE FLYER. By CAPT. MANFRED FRIEDERICH VON RICHTHOFEN. The story of the exploits of the most famous of German aviators, who was killed in action in April, 1918, told in his own words. Von Richthofen was credited with eighty air victories, but a double seated machine counted his two victories under the German system of scoring, which differs from that of the British. New York: Robert M. McBride & Co. \$1.25.

THE U BOAT HUNTERS. By JAMES B. CONNOLLY. Mr. Connolly, who has exceptional opportunities to follow the work of the naval forces, describes the work of the American navy abroad, and particularly the activities of the destroyers. New York: Charles Scribner's Sons. \$1.50.

GERMANY'S COMMERCIAL GRIP ON THE WORLD. By HENRI HAUSER. In his preface to the American edition of this Frenchman's book J. Laurence Laughlin of the University of Chicago says: "As Cheradame has exposed the military and Pan-Germanistic designs of Germany in the East, so Henri Hauser in this volume has reported in striking fashion her economic and industrial methods of penetration into other countries. Cheradame's work is supplemented by that of Hauser. The former has shown how Germany expects to profit by the war; the latter has explained how she gained the economic power to strike the blow." GENSERIC: KING OF THE VANDALS AND FIRST PRUSSIAN KAISER. By FOLGENY BIGELOW. Mr. Bigelow was a personal friend of the German Kaiser from 1870 to 1896. His little historical study is designed to show the parallels between an early monarch who hailed from Potsdam and the present ruler residing in that neighborhood. New York: G. P. COLLECTED MATERIALS FOR THE STUDY OF THE WAR. By ALBERT E. MCKINLEY. Mr. McKinley starts with selections from President Wilson's addresses. A topical of the war follows. Then comes a syllabus for a course of study on events preceding the war. Various maps, a bibliography of material in English relating to the war, war acts of the United States to May 20, 1918, and executive proclamations and orders in our first year of war compose the rest of the book. SIGNS, OMENS AND SUPERSTITIONS. By ASTRA CIELO. This is a sort of compendium compiled without prejudice or condemnation. Where possible, the origin of a superstition is explained. New York: George Sully & Co. 75 cents.

The author is a food expert and presents dozens of recipes and directions for canning vegetables and fruits, for making jellies and pickling, for canning fish and meats, for canning with honey and for drying vegetables and fruits. PETITE ENCYCLOPÉDIE CULINAIRE DE LA CUISINE MODERNE. By J. GANCEL. This contains 8,000 recipes in highly condensed form, a sort of pocket cook book. The author has served for forty years in the kitchen in New York at Louis Sherry's, the Waldorf-Astoria and J. B. Martin's; in Paris at the Cafe Beugnot Pailarg and the Cafe des Ambassadeurs; in San Francisco at Tait's Cafe, and now at the Family Club. The real usefulness of the book, which does not in general give quantities, lies in the fact that, armed with it, you can tell almost instantly the contents of any dish on the bill of fare—if you can read abbreviated French.
