

'GEM' GAFFNEY? POLICE EDICT, NO MEANS BARRED

Harlem Swarms With Gun Laden Detectives in Hunt for Fugitive.

WITH SISTER ALL DAY Fearing Escaped Murderer, Woman Gave Him Shelter and Clothing.

Into Harlem, already harboring more detectives than have been seen there since the Cruger case investigation, went two of the Police Department's champion revolver shots last night with the order, "Get Vincent Gaffney; it doesn't matter how."

News Breaks Up Quis.

The detectives and uniformed men who had figured in the attempted capture of Gaffney before Inspector Cray, Chief of the Detective Bureau, at Headquarters, the questioning began at 3 P. M.

Called on Sister at 8:30.

It was about 3:30 in the afternoon, and the spectral Gaffney had been missing from police vision for about eleven hours when acting Capt. McKenna, chief of the Harlem branch detective bureau, called on Gaffney's sister, Mrs. Tynan, at the 12th street address.

Locked Him in Basement.

Mrs. Tynan said she was anxious to get rid of her brother, but he stayed in her flat until a little after 3 P. M. She took him to the basement and padlocked the door on her, she said, after she had said, "But there is a long court back of the tenement house and through this neighbor's saw a man walk until he reached 11th street."
