

LEWIS OPENS FIGHT IN WHITMAN CAMP

Attorney-General Cordially Received in S. S. Koenig's Federal Club.

ASKS "DRY" REFERENDUM

Governor's Rival Makes Appeal Also for Return of Convention System.

In the stronghold of the enemy—the Federal Club of Samuel S. Koenig—Attorney-General Merton E. Lewis last night opened his speaking campaign for the Republican nomination for Governor.

As a quiet prelude to the main event, a number of women in the audience, one who sat in a front seat applied herself industriously to her knitting.

Mr. Koenig, who is not only the leader of the 84th Assembly district but also leader of the county, sat beside the speaker, as did Perley Morse, Clarence E. Schuster and Alexander Otis.

The Prohibition Amendment.

"I have no fault to find with any one who opposes my nomination," said the Attorney-General. "But there are some important questions that separate me from some of the members of my party. One of these is the question of handling the Federal amendment, which is before this State for ratification.

When the Attorney-General declared that he had always stood on the ground that the question of ratification should go before the people and that he intended to submit himself to the voters on that ground there was applause and some stamping of feet.

Opposes Monopoly in Office.

Then the Attorney-General took up the question of the return to the State convention, declaring that the present law, with the great expense it entailed upon those who would oppose those in office, operated to perpetuate a syndicate of officeholders. It tended, he declared, to give a monopoly of office to those in power and to permit them to remain as long as they cared to do so.

"I contend that this is against the spirit of our institutions," declared the speaker. "Because I differ from my opponent on these two questions and because I believe that if I were elected as a candidate he would be renominated for a third term without opposition I entered the race.

Mr. Lewis was followed by Deputy Attorney-General Alfred L. Travis, who is the Lewis candidate for the nomination for Attorney-General.

TRAVIS TO FIGHT FOR PLACE.

Comptroller Will Appeal From Decision Keeping Him Off Ballot.

Special Dispatch to The Sun. ALBANY, Aug. 21.—Judge Nathan L. Miller will appear with Deputy Attorney-General Becker before the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in Brooklyn on Friday, when the court will be asked to reverse the decision of Justice Crogrey eliminating the name of State Comptroller Travis from the Republican primary ballot.

Secretary of State Hugo has until tomorrow night under the law to send to county election boards notices of candidates to be voted for at the primary election. Justice Crogrey has not yet signed the order taking Travis's name from the Republican primary ballot, but ex-Senator Kissel's attorney wired Secretary Hugo today that he expected to have Justice Crogrey's order in Albany to-morrow. Until that order is filed the Travis notice to the Appellate Division cannot be served.

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OSBORN ATTACKS MURPHY AS 'LORD'

Smith's Rival in Primaries Calls Leader "Funniest Anachronism of Period."

SAYS HIS RULE IS STUPID

Never Contributed an Idea or a Dollar to Party, Candidate Asserts.

When Charles Francis Murphy heard last night that William Church Osborn, who is appealing to the people against the hand-picking of Alfred E. Smith as the Democratic nominee for Governor, had called him one of the "funniest anachronisms of the period," he reached for the telephone, intending to instruct his lawyer to sue the "insurgent" for libel.

"The only thing you can liken Mr. Murphy to is a feudal lord," said Mr. Osborn, drawing a picture of the Democratic "Boss" sitting at a table at Saratoga surrounded by his faithful allies.

"Boss" but Not a Leader. Mr. Osborn, who seeks to become the Democratic candidate for Governor, did not mince words in giving his views of Mr. Murphy, who, he said, might be a "boss," but never had and never represented the people.
