While much has been done to relieve the distress of those who have been wounded in battle, there is opportunity to render further assistance and there will be for some time to come an appeal has been made by the organization known as the American Fund for French Wounded for patronage at a shop which has recently been opened at 501 Fifth avenue for the sale of comfort bags which will be sent to soldiers at the front in France.

These bags meet many of the requirements of soldiers in the field as they contain each a pipe, tobacco, soap, socks, razor and shaving soap, envelopes, pads of writing paper and other articles that are welcome to the soldier. The bags sell at \$2 each and will be sent abroad at the expense of the purchaser. The shop has been donated by Frank W. Volk of the United States Railroad Commission, it having formerly been occupied as a railroad ticket office.

The committee has received many gifts and already more than 250 bags are on their way to France.
