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HILLIS FINDS BERNE PROPAGANDIST CITY

Pastor of Plymouth Church Sees Enemy Agents at Close Range.

VISITS "AMERICAN" TOWN

St. Nazaire in France Has 150,000 Residents, About Half of Them Yankees.

The Rev. Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, who arrived at Atlantic port yesterday on board a British steamship, has been mingling with and scrutinizing peace propagandists, camouflaged agents of the Central Powers and Teutonic braggarts in Switzerland, chiefly at Berne. Among the Germans who were in the Swiss republic in the ten days Dr. Hillis was there were a son of Von Bethmann-Hollweg, formerly German Chancellor, and a son of the Socialist Philipp Scheidemann. The headquarters of the German bluffers and propagandists was the Hotel Bellevue Palace, in Berne, one-half of the dining room of which was reserved for the use of the German agents.

COAL SAVING IN COLD HOMES IS OPPOSED

Garfield Disapproves of Economy Liable to Increase Influenza Peril. Special Despatch to The Sun.
