He spoke last night with a brogue, as he had usually been called in to supersede Cyril Kightly in the leading role. Annie Herndon played the Irish boarding house keeper, Katherine Barrymore her slangy, frivolous daughter, and William Mehan a racketeer. When these characters were together the play was a riot.
