

STAUCH'S FUND FETE DRAWS BIG THROU

Army and Navy Do Bit as
Hundreds Dance to Buy
"Soldiers' Smokes."

BAZAAR TO OPEN TO-DAY

Stage Children Eager to Help
Tobacco Drive—Arista Club
Plans Tournament.

The army and navy helped in their big, free way to make the benefit for THE SUN TOBACCO FUND at Stauch's, Coney Island, on Thanksgiving eve a genuine smoke fund success. Privates W. H. Lincoln, Charles Johnson, Ed La Chase and Andrew Cocurello, U. S. C. G., from Gravesend Bay, and Mack Navon, Forty-eighth Infantry; Charles Sylvester, Twenty-second Infantry, and Lieut. Ruggiers from Camp Lee, Virginia, but themselves temporarily under the command of Jack Brown, floor manager, and told the big crowd, by megaphone and more intimate conversation, what the smoke fund meant to the fighting man.

It seemed as if everybody from Brooklyn's Norton's Point, Valley Stream, Rockaway, Arverne and other winter resorts further afield had collected at Stauch's in honor of the smoke fund. The affair was a "masque and civic" ball, fifth in the annual series, and although its predecessors have left a record of joyousness, this year's party surpassed them all "within the limits of becoming mirth." There were more civic than masqued features, but the seven judges appointed to award prizes to the richest, most characteristic and most amusing messages had enough material passing before them to occupy a good half hour in coming to their decisions.

Hundreds for Fund.

Then the impatient dancers, who knew that closing time was fixed for Coney as well as for its massive neighbor island, got the floor, a very monster of a floor, spacious and glittering, and they wouldn't give it up again even when the music stopped to breathe.

The pecuniary result of the big party to THE SUN TOBACCO FUND can be approximated by an expert accountant when he is told that one-half of the gross sales of admissions at 50 cents a head constituted Mr. Stauch's generous contribution to the Christmas drive for smokes for soldiers abroad and that the dancers were almost like the sands of the beach by sea, too numerous to count. A guess numbers them as about 1,500 men and women.

An attempt was made to intersperse extraneous things to the dance, including an exhibition of first aid and bandaging, furnished by Leo Post and the Ted Snyder company. These interruptions were accepted, but the dance was the order of this party, the dance and a few liquidations.

WILSON RECEIVES MEDAL.

Final Birth Honors President for Service to Humanity.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Officials of the Independent Order of Final Birth presented to President Wilson today the gold medal awarded to him by the society last October as the man who rendered the most distinguished service to humanity during the past year. Adolph Kraus of Chicago, president of the society, Henry Morgenthau of New York, former Ambassador to Turkey; Simon Wolf of Washington and A. B. Peelenfreund of Chicago, secretary, composed the delegation which called at the White House.

Mr. Kraus read a formal salutation lauding the President's championing of permanent peace, the leader of the fight against militarism, cronyism and navy, and expressing the belief that the people of the United States "are fortunate in having at this time as their leader a man whose words carry weight, not only with the Allies but even with the defeated nations."
