

CUBISM HAS SHARE IN DEMUTH EXHIBIT

Varied Collection of Water Color Drawings Is Shown in Daniel Galleries.

LAND-CAPES A FEATURE Sketches of Provincetown Have Prominent Place With Those of Fiction Subjects.

The latest water color drawings by Charles Demuth are now on view in the Daniel Galleries and are marked by the qualities hated by some and admired by others that were to be observed in this artist's work of last year.

Mr. Demuth is a genuine water colorist, getting effects from a natural use of the flow of the water with the colors upon the paper; and genuine water colors are none too plentiful, most painters of the day, for some reason, preferring to use the heavy gouache gouaches in a semblance of oil.

So far it is well and good, but these scenes are less than Demuth's in the fact that this artist goes in heartily to work for the abstract. In other words, to put it bluntly, he has modern tendencies toward cubism, and against those who have prejudices against it, he is so much a mathematician that he will deny even that Mr. Demuth has color and line. Prejudice is a handicap to justice. Mr. Demuth certainly has very good lines and color.

Most of the landscapes in the collection were painted in that much painted city, Provincetown, Mass., but Mr. Demuth has been seen by means of a looking glass in Provincetown. He has merely abstracted a small part of the old trees, and then built up harmonized color schemes upon them. Some of the gables of the houses have been seen with a Merganser in intensity, and some of the old trees have lines that Toulouse-Lautrec would not have been ashamed of.

At the same time it may be stated that not all of the drawings reach the top level of success. Not all of the water colors exhibit show the same concentration of purpose, due no doubt to the fact that all artists find it difficult to concentrate last summer. Mr. Demuth, in short, will have the considerable place he has gained among the younger artists of the day, but will not advance it much by the present exhibition.

He had included in the show a few more water colors the subjects of which have been drawn from literature. He has added to his series of drawings for the Henry James story, "The Turn of the Screw," and also has painted "The Masque of the Red Death," from the story by Poe. This last water color is vivid, almost livid, with color. It is an interesting achievement.

JESSE LEWISOHN DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Former Business Man and Turf Patron Was in His 46th Year.

HAD INFLUENZA FIRST

Leaves Widow, Who Was Miss Edna McCauley, Noted Broadway Beauty.

Jesse Lewisoohn, who was well known in Wall Street circles and for years a familiar figure among theatrical "first nighters" and patrons of the turf here and abroad, died yesterday morning in the Netherlands Hotel, Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, following a week of illness from influenza and pneumonia.

Mr. Lewisoohn, who was in his forty-sixth year, was one of the nine children of the late Leonard Lewisoohn who amassed a fortune in copper and other metals that has been estimated at \$3,000,000. Jesse Lewisoohn until a few years ago was active in the affairs of Lewisoohn Bros., of which he had been a member, and also was vice-president of the United Metal Finishing Company.

Had Periodical Illnesses. During the past decade or so, however, he had given comparatively little time to business affairs in the "street" partly because of his fondness for travel, the turf and other sports, to which he gave much of his attention in recent years, and partly owing to gradually failing health.

Mr. Lewisoohn was operated upon for gall stones in Mount Sinai Hospital in 1917, following a trip he had made into the African jungle to hunt big game. He has had periodical illnesses at intervals, but was not considered to be in a serious condition until pneumonia developed a few days ago, after influenza.

In the glad days of horse racing Mr. Lewisoohn might have been seen almost any day at one of the neighboring racetracks, not only as host to splendid parties but also as the owner of a string of race horses. Mr. Lewisoohn and the late James B. Brady ("Diamond Jim") usually were to be seen together at the tracks.

In England and France, also, up to the beginning of the great war, Mr. Lewisoohn was a regular attendant at the "smart" turf clubs. And in London and Paris, as well as on Broadway, he usually was present at important first night performances.

Married Broadway Beauty. Mr. Lewisoohn's name was familiar to newspaper readers during the wide publicity which attended the efforts of District Attorney Jerome, from 1902 to 1904, to compel the copper man and other young men of wealth to testify against the late Richard A. Caudill.

Mr. Lewisoohn and others fought to the Court of appeals the right of Mr. Jerome to compel them to testify, the highest court upholding the District Attorney. Mr. Lewisoohn did not have to take the stand and testify against Caudill, however, as Caudill, following the decision of the Court of Appeals, immediately took the mark and confessed to being a gambler and was fined.

In June, 1910, Mr. Lewisoohn when traveling abroad was married to Miss Edna McCauley, a Broadway actress noted for her beauty. His brother, Oscar Lewisoohn, who died about a year ago, was the husband of Miss Edna May. Jesse Lewisoohn was a brother-in-law of Martin Vogel, Assistant Treasurer of the United States. Mr. Lewisoohn is survived by his widow, two brothers and four sisters.

MISS DORA JUNE WHEELER. Mrs. Dora June Wheeler, daughter of Mrs. Zora B. Wheeler, of Hollis, L. I., and of the late James Cooper Wheeler, the author, died of pneumonia yesterday at Goodrich College, Baltimore, where she was in her sophomore year. She was in the twenty-first year of her age.

Miss Wheeler was a granddaughter of the Canadian painter, the artist, and author of "Yesterday in a Busy Life" and other works. She was also a cousin of Henry L. Stimson, former Secretary of War.

Mr. Killeen was a member of the Catholic Club, the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, the Democratic Club, the Montauk Club of Brooklyn, the Deal Beach Golf Club, the Whitehall Club, the Asbury Park Fishing Club and the Brooklyn Riding and Driving Club. He was unmarried.

He leaves his mother, Mrs. Annie Roberts Killeen, two brothers, Edward B. and Frederick R. Killeen, and a sister, Sister Miriam Anita of the Sisters of Charity.

CAMP UPTON, N. Y., Nov. 30.—First Lieut. Harry Taylor Moore, assistant to the camp adjutant, died here to-day of pneumonia, which developed from influenza. His body will be taken to the home of his parents in Middletown, N. Y., to-morrow and will be accompanied by two Headquarters Staff officers. The funeral will be held on Monday.

Mrs. Moore, who was Miss Lynda Hoak of Middletown, is recovering from pneumonia in the base hospital here, where she was stricken while attending her husband.

Lieut. Moore was 24 years old. While a student at Andover he was captain of the swimming team. He was graduated from the first Plattaburg camp and was assigned to the 30th Infantry here. Before the unit left for overseas he was detached for staff duty.
