

ROUT IN PALESTINE LAID TO GENERAL

German Writer Accuses Von Sanders of "Incredible Incapacity."

SAVED HIS DAUGHTERS

Complete Debacle Followed When Chief Flew Far in Rear of Troops.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 25 (delayed).—The staggering completeness of the Turkish debacles in Palestine and Syria is shown in the story of a recent episode published in the *Vossische Zeitung* of Berlin. The writer attacks Gen. Liman von Sanders, the German commander in the Turkish field of operations, for his "incredible incapacity and negligence." The German general's entire concern, he declares, was for the safety of his daughters, who were at a seaside resort. He likewise confirms the British reports of the general's flight, which the British official statement worded: "The enemy commander in chief fled far in the rear of his troops."

How the British break through occurred on September 18 west of the Jordan is described by the writer. The whole of the German Headquarters Staff was captured in their beds on September 20 and a complete rout followed. East of the Jordan "the troops of the Turkish army heard of the break through too late to retreat successfully. The British fell on their rear and their position became hopeless. Small detachments vainly tried to cut their way through. The roads were blocked and there was no leadership among the enemy forces, while the men were continuously harried by Australian cavalry and British aircraft."

The Turks were rarely seen on the retreat. They either fled in good time or surrendered. Two German detachments, the writer declares, made a last gallant effort to stem the tide, but when this resistance broke down the remnants of the army fled, completely demoralized, to Aleppo, where they added to the confusion prevailing there. An epidemic of influenza completed the havoc. The account ends thus: "All the army saved was four guns, the commander in chief, his daughters and the latter's baggage."

CHILE SENDS TROOPS TO ANTOFAGASTA

Serious Demonstrations Are Reported From Santiago.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Nov. 30.—The demonstrations at Antofagasta have assumed such a serious character that the Chilean Government has sent the cruiser *Capitan Prat* to that port with troops, according to press despatches received here from Santiago. The First and Second army divisions have been ordered mobilized.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—An official report from the Foreign Minister of Chile charging Peruvian Consul-General Lloa with responsibility for the recent trouble between the two countries at Iquique and specifically denying that Lloa was forced to return to Peru was received to-day at the Chilean Embassy.

The Consul-General, the report said, left Valparaiso on instructions from his home office and had been shown every consideration by the Chilean authorities. In an interview at Valparaiso the Consul-General had said as saying that he had in no way influenced his Government in the issuance of the order for his recall and denying that his fellow countrymen had complained to him regarding the treatment accorded them by the people of Chile.

Mr. Le Lorrain, French Vice-Consul and dean of the consular corps at Iquique, in the absence of Senor Lloa, has addressed a communication to Provincial Governor Amnengual, according to advice to the Chilean Embassy, stating that he had given to the members of the diplomatic corps a message from Senor Lloa saying he "was compelled to go aboard ship and to sail from Iquique." The Vice-consul added:

"Being positive that the fact referred to was entirely foreign to the policy of the authorities, it has been deemed to inform you of the foregoing in order that you might reflect that measures be taken to avoid a repetition of that action in order that if it occurred it should not become a precedent."

NORDICA'S HUSBAND APPEALS.

N. J. Supreme Court Asked to Pass on \$100,000 Will Cutting Him Out.

On behalf of George W. Young, who does not share in the \$400,000 estate left by his wife, the late Mrs. Lillian Nordica, appeal was taken yesterday to the Supreme Court of New Jersey from the decision of Vice-Chief Justice Stevenson of the Prerogative Court, who upheld the finding of the Monmouth County Orphans Court, submitting to probate the opera singer's will. The estate was left to the singer's sisters, except \$30,000 which went to E. Romayne Simmons, her accomplice.

Mr. Young contends that his wife was unduly influenced when she made her will as she lay dying in a hospital on Thursday Island in the Pacific Ocean. In a prior will, dated July, 1910, the appellant received everything.

Testimony in the lower court was that relations between Mr. Young and his wife were strained but that his counsel produced letters and telegrams to refute the charges.

COUNCIL AIDS WAR WORKERS.

Defense Field Division Units to Get Jobs for Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Grosvener B. Clarkson, director of the field division of the Council of National Defense, to-day instructed chairmen of State, county and community defense councils to cooperate with the United States Employment Service in finding jobs for demobilized soldiers and war workers.

This action calls to the aid of the service 182,432 units of the council's machinery in all of the States.
